

Pastor's Letter



April, 2013

"He Is Risen!" "He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia!"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

His classmates noticed that eight year old Stephen's mental retardation was becoming more and more obvious. The Sunday School teacher was worried that the other children in the class might begin to notice and she was afraid of the way they might treat him. Several weeks before Easter, she asked all nine of the children in her class to get one of those Leggs stocking containers, the ones that look like a plastic egg. Each child was to put something into the egg that represented life in Spring. Fearing that Stephen may not have caught on, and wanting to protect him, she had the children place all of the Leggs eggs on her desk, unlabeled, so that she could open them. The first container had a tiny flower. "What a lovely sign of life!" Donna couldn't help but erupt, "I brought that one."

Next came a rock. That must be Stephen's since rocks don't symbolize new life, but little Billy shouted that the rock had moss on it and that represented new life. A butterfly flew from another of the containers and the owner raised her hand to identify it as hers. The fourth Leggs container was empty, "It had to be Stephen's," thought the teacher, quickly reaching for the fifth one. "But please don't skip mine," Stephen yelled. "But its empty Stephen," said the teacher. "That's right," said Stephen. "The tomb was empty and that's new life for everyone."

A blessed Easter to all of you! The Christian Church on earth celebrates the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead. We mourned his death on the cross on Good Friday. Now we rejoice that death could not hold him down. He Lives! And we celebrate. We celebrate because we believe that, through Baptism, we have been united to Christ. Where Jesus goes, we go with Him. If Jesus had not been raised from the dead, it would mean that there was no hope that we would ever be raised from the dead either. And so, His resurrection is our celebration.

There are times when 'empty' means 'full' and Easter is just such a time.

A young boy saw for the first time a picture of the crucified Jesus hanging on the cross. It upset him to see the cruel nails driven clear through the wrist and the feet and the crown of thorns pushed into the head. After looking at it for a long time, he turned away with this comment, "If God had been there, he would not have let them do that."

That's the reaction of people who don't know what the empty tomb means for them. Oh that we would be as smart as young Stephen to know that the God, who allowed his Son to be acclaimed King on Palm Sunday, also allowed him to be crucified for our salvation on Good Friday, and also raised him to glory on Easter morning. And now we have reason to celebrate.

Do you know what His resurrection means for you? Stephen's classmates learned to know how important the emptiness of the tomb of Jesus was for them. That summer, Stephens' condition worsened and he died. At the funeral, just before the casket was closed, each of the children came forward and placed a Leggs stocking container inside. Needless to say, they were all empty.

FROM PAUL ROCKROHR - SEMINARIAN

[While attending the Symposia at Concordia Theological Seminary in Ft. Wayne in January, I was delighted to have the chance to have lunch with Jonathan Williams and Paul Rockrohr, Seminary students whom we are supporting. Here is a recent letter from Paul Rockrohr.]

Dear Pastor Nielsen and Members of Lutheran Church of the Resurrection,

Firstly, I must apologize for not having written in so long. Your generosity has been extremely gracious and very much appreciated; though I fear I have not always showed my gratitude to you as I ought. Your regular support has been a God send in many ways, and my wife and I are extremely thankful to you for it.

I hope that Pastor brought my greetings with him after Symposium. It was really wonderful to meet him and hear more about you. I trust that he was able to give you a few more details about me after a great lunch together, but so much has happened in the last six months that Stacy and I thought it would be good to share a bit of it. As you may now know, we were married on Dec. 16th, at Concordia University Wisconsin's chapel. The pastor was Dr. Maschke, a professor there, which is actually quite fun because not only was he one of my professors, but also my father's professor, and he did my parents premarital counseling so many years ago. I've heard stories from pastors about how strange it is to baptize the infants of parents who were themselves baptized by the same pastor. It seems to me (and Stacy too) that this runs

in the same line of thinking. It is one the jokes I now share with Dr. Maschke, that he must be getting old to have married the son of someone he prepared for marriage!

The other great thing about the wedding is that my parents and youngest brother were able to fly in from South Africa for that week. Obviously that trip is not a cheap one, but because of the timing not only did we have the whole family there, we also got to have an earlier Christmas (Dec. 17th) together with both sets of grandparents, my three siblings, my new wife, and my parents. I certainly didn't mind moving it a few days on the calendar to be able to spend it with loved ones, that and it is always fun to have multiple celebrations! They left for South Africa again a few days later, and have been doing well. To my knowledge the work is going very well over there and they really enjoy being able to serve the church in South Africa.

After the initial three weeks together, Stacy and I are basically living apart until sometime in July. She is finishing up her last year of classes in the Doctorate of Pharmacy program at CUW, with internships starting mid-May. I am continuing at Fort Wayne, with just one more quarter to go before vicarage. While the seminary is informed of our situation, we are hoping that I will be placed in the Milwaukee area for vicarage, because that is where her internships are. But until the placements are made we leave these things in God's hands because today has enough trouble of its own to worry about. Until such a time as it is revealed, there are many other things that are coming up.

At the moment I will be in training for the Navy Chaplaincy Program from May 11- June 14 in Providence RI. That means I need to leave school about a week and a half early, so this quarter will be a bit crazy trying to accomplish all the assignments. Immediately after this training I will be helping with Christ Academy at the seminary for two weeks, acting as a proctor for 20 or so high school boys. It was a really rewarding and growing experience last year, albeit very stressful. I am hoping that I will be able to handle it with some patience after being yelled at by instructors for thirty-some days, but I'm sure I will walk away happy that I did it again. In all this Stacy is and has been a rock of fortitude, going along with the hectic life of being a Rockrohr that never seems to cease. 8 days from now we will have been married 3 months, and after only three months she has proven time and again to be such an excellent wife in the midst of so much unknown.

As you can see, we have a great deal coming in the next few months between being apart and the various tasks at hand. Your support financially has been a great blessing, but these next few months perhaps especially require your spiritual support in prayer for us. And this seems to be a fitting request in the midst of Lent, since this is a time of repentance, to consider our unworthiness and that great sacrifice which our Lord made for us. And what is repentance other than recognizing the proper relationship between us and our Lord? "Be still and know I am God" He says, and to this we may say "yes, and you are the Giver of all good things." Because of Christ we now may approach our Father in heaven and ask as children for all things. So Stacy and I ask you to also beseech Him on our behalf, as our brothers and sisters, that He may continue to bless us and give us strength for the task at hand. In all things, your remain in our hearts and minds as our brothers and sisters in the faith, those that reach out and care for us as only family can.
