

June, 2015 Properly Prepared to Receive the Lord's Supper

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Question: Who receives this sacrament worthily?

Answer: Fasting and bodily preparation are certainly fine outward training. But that person is truly worthy and well prepared who has faith in these words: 'Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins.' But anyone who does not believe these words or doubts them is unworthy and unprepared, for the words, 'for you' require all hearts to believe. (*Luther's Small Catechism*)

Three questions that we should ask ourselves before receiving the Lord's Supper:

#1 - "Do I admit that I am a sinner before God and am I gravely sorry for my sin?"

"If we say that we have no sin we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us." (1 John 1:8) But we live in a world that is hell-bent on redefining sin so that we may indeed say that it does not apply to us. Are we willing to hear the Word of God tell us what sin is and what it is not and let His Word accuse us as guilty before God?

"If we say that we have no sin we deceive ourselves and the truth is not in us. If we say we have not sinned we make God out to be a liar and His Word has no place in our lives." (1 John 1:10,12).

#2 - "Do I believe that my savior Jesus Christ is present in this Sacrament for the forgiveness of my sins?"

Jesus gives us Himself in the bread and wine by His Word, "This is my body, this is my blood, given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins." This is the body and blood that was "crucified, died and buried" outside Jerusalem 2,000 years ago. It is the very Lamb of God who was "slain from the foundation of the world" according to Revelation and raised from the dead on the 3rd day according to the gospels.

"What is the use or fruit of this sacrament? Listen to this: "given for you" "shed for you." I go to the sacrament in order to take and use Christ's body and blood given and shed for me. When the minister intones, "This cup is the New Testament in my blood," to whom is it spoken? Not to my dog, but to those who are gathered to take the sacrament. These words must be apprehended by faith. Therefore I use the sacrament for the forgiveness of my sins; I say: I will go and take the body and blood; it is a sure sign that it was instituted form me against my death. "Which is given for you." There is the benefit." (Martin Luther)

#3 - "Do I plan, with the help of the Holy Spirit, to amend my sinful life?"

This is what the word 'repentance' is all about. It is not right to say 'I am sorry for my sin and I believe Jesus when He says that this is His blood and body given and shed for me for the forgiveness of sins, but I have no desire to change my mind in the sinful matter I am currently engaged in.' To come to the Lord's Supper without a sincere desire to change the sinful behavior is misuse of this sacrament.

"They, however, receive it unworthily who knowingly and intentionally persist in their sins, such as revengeful wrath, murder, fornication, adultery and similar manifest sins and crimes. Christ instituted the Holy Sacrament unto the forgiveness of our sins, that we should forsake them and not continue in them... He declares it to be damnable, if persons deliberately sin, and then go to the Sacrament as though nothing had happened. Those who act thus, eat and drink the sacrament unworthily, and God punishes them with sickness and other afflictions... The best thing we can do, under such circumstances, would be to put a stop to such wickedness, to repent, to trust faithfully in the promises and mercy of God, and to unite again with Christians in the participation of the Holy Sacrament." (Martin Luther)

"Let a person examine himself then, and so eat of the bread and drink of the cup."



The Sacrament of the Altar

Thus we have the entire Sacrament, both as to what it is in itself and as to what it brings and profits. Now we must also see who is the person that receives this power and benefit. That is answered briefly, as we said above of Baptism and often elsewhere: Whoever believes it has what the words declare and bring. For they are not spoken or proclaimed to stone and wood, but to those who hear them, to whom He says: Take and eat, etc. And because He offers and promises forgiveness of sin, it cannot be received otherwise than by faith. This faith He Himself demands in the Word when He says: Given and shed for you. As if He said: For this reason I give it, and bid you eat and drink, that you may claim it as yours and enjoy it. Whoever now accepts these words, and believes that what they declare is true, has it. But whoever does not believe it has nothing, as he allows it to be offered to him in vain, and refuses to enjoy such a saving good. The treasure, indeed, is opened and placed at every one's door, yea upon his table, but it is necessary that you also claim it, and confidently view it as the words suggest to you. (Martin Luther – Large Catechism)
