

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# Pastor's Letter May, 2011

Funeral Sermon George Kohl April 10, 2011

Grace to you, and peace from God our Father, and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

"Thy works, not mine, O Christ, speak gladness to this heart; they tell me all is done, they bid my fears depart." (LSB #565 st.1)

There is nothing that speaks gladness to our heart in the face of death, except the Word of God, because this Word tells us about the WORKS OF CHRIST and that ALL IS DONE, or as Christ Himself put it – IT IS FINISHED!

"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your hearts be troubled, neither let them be afraid." (John 14:27)

The story is told of a father and his young daughter who went for a drive together. It was a nice day and the windows of the car were open. Everything was going just fine until a bee flew into the car. The little girl was terrified of bees. The father said, 'don't be afraid' as he snatched the bee off the dashboard in his hand. He winced as the stinger went into palm. But then, he opened his hand and released the bee as said to his daughter, 'there, nothing to be afraid of. It can't hurt you anymore.'

Jesus Christ took the sting of death into Himself. Just look at His palms and you'll see where the iron stingers went all the way through. But because He has taken the sting of death into Himself, we need no longer fear death.

"Thy wounds not mine O Christ, can heal my bruised soul; thy stripes, not mine contain the balm that makes me whole." (LSB #565 st.2)

Just before we sang the hymn, you spoke the words of St. Paul to the Philippians. "For me to live is Christ and to die is gain. If I am to go on living in the body, this will mean fruitful labor for me. Yet what shall I choose? I don not know! I am torn between the two; I desire to depart and be with Christ, which his better by far." (Phil. 1:21-23).

Unlike St. Paul, George Kohl was not torn between living and dying. He did not desire to depart and be with Christ. His desire was to go on living in the body and continue his fruitful labor. He wanted Julie to get his laptop from school so that he could put together some lesson plans for his students. He didn't want them to fall behind. After more than 20 years of teaching, he was still gaining momentum.

He loved his work and he loved his students. Just eight hours before he died, he was talking about how fortunate he was to have had so many wonderful students.

How many of you here are or have been one of Mr. Kohl's students, raise your hands. I've read your comments on 'facebook.' You have paid him a wonderful tribute. I understand that you had already planned to dedicate this year's Yearbook to Mr. Kohl.

As I read your wonderful comments though, I couldn't help but wonder how many of you told him how you felt about him while he was still alive? Take the opportunity to express your appreciation to your teachers and to your parents while you have the chance.

We heard the words of the Prophet Isaiah remind us that "all men are like grass, and their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall." Man is mortal and mortal man does not live forever. No matter how glorious our life is, no matter how indispensable we think we are, we will all die. For some, it comes far too soon. For others, it takes far too long.

There is an idea that has been circulating around for quite a while that this is all that there is to a person's life. You're born, you live, you die, and that's all that there is. I don't know where that idea comes from, because even if you look at the grass or the flowers of the field, they die but they come back to life again. We could learn something about our life from the grass and flowers.

God has built hints of resurrection from death into nature. Everyday the sun sets only to rise again every morning to shatter the darkness of the night. The crocuses are just beginning to bloom, reminding us that that which lies buried in the ground is not dead but arises in beauty. God has put these reminders of resurrection from death all around us and we would do well to pay attention to them with the eyes of faith.

But we would do even better to pay attention to the Word the of the Lord. "The grass withers and the flowers fall, BUT THE WORD OF THE LORD STANDS FOREVER."

The Word of the Lord is the good news that God so loved George Kohl, and you, that He sent His only Son, that whoever believes in him would NOT DIE, but have eternal life."

Sad to say, but unlike the grass and the flowers of the field, God did not make men and women in such a way that they rise again on his own. The grass and the flowers rise from the ground according to the rotation of the earth around the sun and the seasons of the year. But that is not the case with man. And that's because of sin.

Grass and flowers don't sin against God. They don't rebel against their creator. They always do just what they were created by God to do. But man was created with the capacity to sin against God. A capacity that the very first man and woman exercised. And ever since, men and woman have not been capable of not sinning. And where there is sin there is death. And as long as sin remains there can be no life, no resurrection from the dead.

So the good news, the very best news, is that God sent His Son, Jesus Christ into this world to take away the sin of the world. He did not come into this world to take away the sin of the grass and flowers, but to take away the sin of men and women, boys and girls, so that we would not die but live. He took the sin of the world upon Himself and crucified it in His body on the cross. And now that sin has been atoned for, there can be a resurrection from the dead. And sure enough, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> day, He rose from the dead. "Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed, alleluia!"

# "So, if God so clothes the grass of the field, which today is alive and tomorrow is thrown into the oven, will he not much more clothe you, O you of little faith?" (Matthew 6:30)

"Thy cross, not mine, O Christ, has borne the crushing load of sins that none could bear but the incarnate God." (LSB #565 st.3)

In 1952, George Kohl was united to the death and the resurrection of Jesus Christ through Holy Baptism. All of his sins were washed away in the water. "His death was swallowed up in Christ's victory over death. (1 Corinthians 15:56)

I beg you not to misunderstand my intentions here. It is not my intention to evangelize. This is not the time for that. But it is my intention to offer REAL COMFORT to Julie and Sarah and all of who mourn the loss of a wonderful man, a son and brother and friend, a co-worker, a teacher, a neighbor. And I know of no other REAL COMFORT to offer than that of the Word of the Lord.

I tell you with complete confidence that even though George Kohl has died, yet he lives, because THE WORD OF THE LORD STANDS FOREVER. The Kingdom of God will not be shut down. "I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in me will live, even though he dies." (John 11:25). "Whoever believes and is baptized shall be saved." (Mark 16:16)

So let a new idea take root in your heart and mind. The idea that, by the atoning sacrifice of Christ crucified, God has opened the door to birth, life, death and then, RESURRECTION TO ETERNAL LIFE.

So even while we here continue to struggle with the bonds of sin, the dead in Christ are once and for all set free from those bonds.

Even while we grieve and shed many tears, God has wiped away every tear from their eyes.

Even while we suffer with sickness and pain, they are set from from all suffering and pain.

Even while we enjoy fleeting moments of happiness and joy, their joy never ceases.

"Thy righteousness, O Christ, alone can cover me;

no righteousness avails save that which is of Thee.

To whom save Thee, who canst alone for sin atone, Lord, shall I flee?" (LSB #565 st.5)

In the name of Jesus. Amen.

### Hello!

I am writing to thank you for your support that helped me go the help rebuild New Orleans last week and tell you a bit about my experience. After a very long bus ride, I and about fifty other college students from Brown, RISD, and Middlebury arrived in New Orleans. We stayed in a building owned by a local church that hosts volunteers frequently. They had rooms with bunk beds for us and cooked us wonderful food. While we were there we got to eat lots of New Orleans style food including red beans & rice, jambalaya, and boiled shrimp. When we went into the tourist area of the city for an afternoon, I also got to eat amazing crab cakes and Beignets.

But I didn't go to New Orleans for the food; so on to the actual reason I was there. On our first afternoon in NOLA we took a bus tour of the city, mainly going through the 9<sup>th</sup> Ward (the poorest area) and downtown/the French Quarter (the tourist area). As I went through the downtown area, it was amazing to think that much of it was many feet underwater. It has been so well built back up, you can hardly tell. In contrast, the 9<sup>th</sup> Ward still has many houses that have hardly been touched since the storm and some houses are completely gone. It is so strange to see the houses that already have been fixed right next to the ones that have a long way to go. A lot of the fixed houses are colorful, artsy, and quite beautiful. The 9<sup>th</sup> Ward is the farthest area below sea level in New Orleans and the levy broke there so it had the worst flooding. I had not realized how much work still needs to be done there. Apparently since many people inherit houses from their parents and the houses don't always change names properly, insurance companies tell the residents that it turns out their houses are not insured. Because of this, a large fraction of houses can only be rebuilt with the help of volunteers.

The house that I helped rebuild was a brick house in the Upper 9<sup>th</sup> Ward that got badly flooded but the structure remained intact. Before we got there, the house had been completely gutted and any missing wooden framework inside had been replaced. Our job for the week was to put up insulation and drywall. It was hard work and very satisfying. We finished the insulation and made good progress on the drywall. Barbara, the woman to whom the house belongs is staying a couple blocks away so she dropped by a few times a day. It was great to see her and see her excitement that she is finally going to be able to move back home.

Thank you so much for helping make this trip possible for me. I'm really glad that I was able to go!

# MISSION GRANT STORY

# BODY AND SOUL CARE FOR CHILDREN IN INDIA: \$50,000

"Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful" (Luke 6:36).

The India Evangelical Lutheran Church (IELC) is reaching out to its members and others with physical care and the saving Gospel message. Through Christ's mercy this grant will touch children and young adults in great need in the Tamil Nadu District of India.

In 1930 the Missouri Evangelical Lutheran India Mission (MELIM) School was built for the children of mine workers at the Kolar Gold Fields. After being taken over by the government, the mines were depleted and the workers became unemployed and homeless. These workers are now unable to pay school fees or feed their children. A portion of this grant will be used to assist 115 students with school supplies, hygiene items, food, school uniforms, and shoes. This aid will improve the living conditions of these students and through this care bring families and community members into the life of the church.

With some of the remaining grant money the IELC will develop a vocational and educational program for girls who drop out of school. Many of these girls are sold and forced into prostitution. The Bethesda Hospital in Tamil Nadu, India, would like to start a two-year vocational/educational program through which girls can be trained to serve as nurses' assistants. They would also receive help to find employment in reputable healthcare facilities. This grant provides funds for 20 students.

The IELC would also assist the town of Kanyakumari with education and employment training for tsunami-affected young adults. In the four years since the tsunami, residents have not recovered from the economic and psychological despair that plagues this area. There are few educational and employment opportunities; thus many young people turn to criminal acts in

an attempt to support themselves. A resource center would be set up where the church will provide three months of education and job training for these young adults. The plan is to assist three groups of 15 students each. After completion of this training, the participants will receive a set of tools or a modest amount of money enabling them to become self-sufficient.

With the help and prayers of the LWML this grant of \$50,000 will provide education to the downtrodden children and young adults of India.


