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Pastor's Letter



April, 2011

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

For 18 months, I had the real pleasure of working with five young men and women in their preparation for the Rite of Confirmation and reception of the Lord's Supper. On February 20th, the 7th Sunday after the Epiphany, they were examined before the congregation and each presented their essays. Each essay was a confession of faith, both their own and that of the One, Holy, Christian and Apostolic Church. I hope that you will find as much edification and encouragement from them as we all did when we heard them delivered. They are presented here in the order in which they were originally given, based on their place among the Six Chief Parts of Luther's Small Catechism.

Tiana Thomas.

Assigned topic: "How does the Son accomplish my salvation?"

In John 3:16 it is written, "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish, but have eternal life." With this being said, Jesus simply means "the Lord saves." It is amazing how God allowed his one and only Son to die on the cross for my salvation. It is also through the Word and sacraments in which the gift of faith in Christ and the forgiveness of sins and eternal life are given to me and all believers. I trust in Jesus Christ as my only Savoir to save me from sin, death, the devil, and to give me the gift of eternal life.

Why was it necessary for our Savior to be true man and true God? Christ had to be true man in order to take our place under the Law and fulfill it for us. He also had to suffer and die for our guilt to take the punishment we deserved for our sin.

Assigned topic: "What is the role of the Holy Spirit in the life of faith?"

The Holy Spirit is the third person of the holy Trinity. True God with the Father and the Son. We need the Holy Spirit because by our human nature we are spiritually blind, dead and an enemy of God. Therefore I cannot by my reason or strength believe in Jesus Christ or come to Him.

Assigned topic: "What is the place of prayer in the life of faith?"

"I thank you my heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, your dear Son, that you have kept me this night from all harm and danger, and I pray that you would keep me this day also from sin and every evil, that all my doings in life may please you. For into my hands I commend myself, my body and soul and all things. Let your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen" (Luther's Morning Prayer).

Luther's Morning Prayer is the prayer we prayed at the beginning of each of our confirmation classes. It helped us get our minds focused to learn about God, and has provided a wonderful example of the way we should be praying daily to our Father in heaven.

What is prayer? Prayer is talking to God through our thoughts and words. In the technology driven world we live in today, praying to God is even easier than sending text messages or chatting with a friend on Facebook. Even before facebook, God hears every thought. We should only pray to the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. We pray to God to ask for help with our daily needs and to ask for forgiveness of our sins. When we pray we should ask God to help people in need. We should also pray for our friends and family. When we pray we should thank and praise God, just as we hear in Psalm 136:1, "Give thanks to the Lord, for He is good. His love endures forever."

When and where should we pray? We can pray anywhere. Mostly we pray in church, or when we are by ourselves, or with our families. I pray in church, with my family, and before I go to sleep at night. Our family normally prays this prayer before dinner: God is good, God is great, and we thank him for our food and family. Amen. God hears the prayers of every believer. Even though we might not think God is listening, God hears our prayers but answers in his own time and own way, as we read in Isaiah 65:24, "Before they call I will answer; while they are still speaking I will hear." God does not hear the prayers of unbelievers because they are not praying in his name.

The prayer that our Lord has given us is the Lord's Prayer. In the Lord's Prayer, we are told that God loves us and that he wants us to pray to him without fear. God wants us to pray in his name and with confidence. When we pray by ourselves we should talk to God about any troubles we are having in our life. We should never be nervous or afraid to talk to God. Praying for our enemies is also needed because they need to be

forgiven for what they have done wrong to us. We need God"s help to apologize to them for the wrong things that we have done.

For me, prayer is a way to get my feelings out. God listens to me and does not get upset at me for what I say. I know that if I am having a bad day, and just need to talk to someone about something, God will be there for me. If you ever need to talk to someone, God is the one you should talk to. If you are ever feeling pressure about something, you should talk to God and he will help you work through your problems. I can also turn to God to ask for forgiveness when I make mistakes, to thank him for sending Jesus as my savior, to praise him for all he does for me everyday, even helping me through the 200 yard breaststroke race!

Just like we began our confirmation classes in prayer, we ended each class with Luther's evening prayer. It seems appropriate to end this discussion about prayer with those words, "I thank you my Heavenly Father, through Jesus Christ, your dear Son, that You have graciously kept me this day, and I pray that you would forgive me all my sins where I have done wrong, and graciously keep me this night. For into Your hands I commend myself, my body and soul, and all things. Let your holy angel be with me, that the evil foe may have no power over me. Amen" (Luther's Evening Prayer).

Assigned topic: What is Holy Baptism and how is it significant to the life of faith?"

Going to church each Sunday, we all walk past the baptismal font on our way to receive the Lord's Supper. But do we really understand what lies inside? It doesn't just contain plain water, but holy, divine water. The water of baptism contains God's Holy word and promise. It holds forgiveness of sins, eternal salvation, and it can rescue us from death and the devil. It gives me the gift of faith so that I may believe what God does for me in this font. As Mark says in 16:16, "Whoever believes and is baptized will be saved, but whoever does not believe will be condemned."

God commands in Matthew 28:19, "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Therefore, baptism is not just something man came up with on his own. Baptism was instituted by God Himself, and He said that **all nations** are to be baptized. That includes people of all ages, even infants. Some people disagree and say that if babies can not understand what it means to be baptized, then they should wait until they are older and can comprehend what baptism truly is. However, babies are included in "all nations" and babies can certainly have faith. Infants are also born with original sin and need the forgiveness, just as much as I do, and therefore, they need what God does through baptism. Baptism does not depend on our abilities, or how much we can comprehend, but is God's way of saving helpless sinners of any age.

Before a person is baptized, the Old Adam, a corrupt and evil nature, is still living within him or her. When Holy Baptism occurs, the "Old Adam" is drowned and dies with all sin and evil desires, and a New Adam emerges. The New Adam is the new spiritual life and nature that strives to live and grow before God in the one true faith. So, as a baptized child of God, I want to live according to the new life God has given me and not the old, sinful life he has drowned. In order to let this new life come out and live within me, I must strengthen and learn about my faith by going to church and studying the Bible. Since I want to live a new life with God, I want to obey what He commands.

As you can see, there is no way that plain water can do things this great. As Luther says in the Small Catechism, "For without God's word, the water is plain water and no Baptism. But with the word of God it is a baptism, that is, a life-giving water, rich in grace, and a washing of the new birth in the Holy Spirit."

So the next time you walk past the baptismal font, take a second to realize the power it holds, not because it holds water, but because the water holds the word of God, forgiveness of sins, eternal life, and deliverance from death and the devil.

Assigned topic: "What is The Lord's Supper and how is it significant to the life of faith"

A fairly normal conversation for me is- "Hey Arthur, are you doing anything Sunday evening?" "I have confirmation class." "Oh, that stinks." Because I am a teenager, my friends assume that I don't care about religion and that my parents force me to be religious. But that just isn't true. I go to confirmation class not so I can get an allowance from my earthly parents, but so I can receive forgiveness from my heavenly Father. I go to confirmation so I may receive Communion.

On the day before his crucifixion, Jesus gave his disciples the first Lord's Supper. He gave them bread and wine, and told them they were his body and blood. Although this would sound crazy to most people, the disciples had been with Jesus for a long time and had figured out that if he said something, it had a way of being true. In Matthew Chapter 26, we read, "While they were eating, Jesus took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to his disciples saying, "Take and eat, this is my body." Then he took the cup, gave thanks and offered it to them, saying, "Drink from it, all of you. This is my blood which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins."" According to Luther, the benefit of this is exactly what it says. "These words, "Given and shed for you for the forgiveness of sins," show us that in the sacrament forgiveness of sins, life and salvation are given to us through these words." That is the reason that I go to church not only Sunday Morning, but also evening- so that I can receive these amazing gifts from my Father.

The amazing thing, (Well, one of the amazing things) about the Lord's Supper is that nothing we do makes it what it is. Communion gets what it is from God, not our beliefs. However, this makes it dangerous as well, because if we treat it wrong, then we are treating Jesus' body and blood wrong. Luther says that those who openly do not believe or are unrepentant should not be given the Lord's supper. This is not as a punishment, but to protect them. However, those who are weak in there faith should definitely be given The Lord's Supper so that their faith will be strengthened.

Communion is one of the most important parts of the life of faith. It not only gives forgiveness but also helps to strengthen faith. That's what I'm looking forward to most. Not finally having my Sunday evenings free, but to receive communion.

A daughter was telling her mother how everything was going wrong: she was failing algebra, her boyfriend broke up with her and her best friend is moving away.


Meanwhile, her mother was baking a cake and asked the daughter if she would like a snack. The daughter said, "Absolutely, Mom, I love your cake."
