Pastor's Letter



May, 2015 "Individual Confession and Absolution" - Part II

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In the March 2015 Newsletter, I wrote about "Individual Confession and Absolution." I suspect that for many of us this was a new topic and may have been the first time you had ever heard of such a thing. As is often the case, new ideas take a while to sink in before we're ready to give them a try.

Last month, I wrote briefly about what "Individual Confession and Absolution" is and is not. 'Individual Confession' is the acknowledgement of a particular sin, out loud, in the presence of another person, usually the pastor. 'Individual Absolution' is nothing other than the Gospel of forgiveness applied individually to you for this particular sin.

This month, I'd like to write briefly about the great value of "Individual Confession and Absolution."

The power of sin to do harm and create trouble is well known to anyone who has a beating heart. I can think of three ways that sin does its' damage. Sometimes it's 'gross sin,' that is blatantly evil and causes both bodily and/or emotional harm to another person and yourself. But sometimes it's as subtle as a careless word spoken at the wrong time or in the wrong tone of voice that caused hurt feelings even though there was no harm intended. And sometimes it's a sinful habit(s) that just won't go away and leave you alone no matter how much you tell it to.

In addition to bodily harm and broken relationships and destructive habits, sin also dumps a heavy load of GUILT wherever it strikes. And GUILT is a debilitating thing.

I realize that we have been conditioned to deal with GUILT in a number of unbiblical and unproductive ways. Justifying our bad behavior is the most common approach to dealing with GUILT. "Don't worry. There's nothing to feel GUILTY about." Hmmmm.... Not helpful. Typically, attempts to escape our GUILT apart from the Gospel just lead to more sin and more guilt.

If nothing else, maybe the deeper lesson here is that everyone agrees that GUILT needs to be dealt with. The only question is, 'how?'

The great value of "Individual Confession and Absolution" is that it deals with the GUILT caused by our sin with the power of God. I'm not sure I can pin this down as precisely as I'd like to, but there is something powerful in confessing the individual sin that has dumped its load of GUILT on me out loud, and hearing the absolution come back to me out loud, that not only forgives my sin, but that also lifts the GUILT. I'm not sure why the 'out loud' is important, but it is. (I'm thinking that it's connected to the power of the 'spoken word' of God. Just as God's Word is powerful to create and strengthen faith when it is 'spoken/preached,' so also is our confession of sin is powerful when it is spoken out loud. Don't hold me to that quite yet. But I do think that it is an idea worth testing.)

Set free from GUILT, we are now set free to address the harm that we have caused by our sin, apologize to the one we've harmed by our careless words and even break free of our destructive habits and amend our sinful lives. Wounds healed, relationships renewed, lifestyles redirected. There's value in that.

Seeking to Serve...notes from a Deaconess student

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Another month has zoomed past! By the time you see this I will be about finished with the first of my two "spring" classes. I have had much to digest, learn and respond to in this church history course. This week I need to write a paper describing the background or history of five religious societies in our community. I also have to take my final test for the class.

A summary response I wrote during my second week of this course after reading "The Freedom of the Christian" by Martin Luther concerns faith and love:

Faith, or trust, is freely given to us because of God's love for us in becoming man (humbling himself) in Jesus Christ. When this faith is given to us through the Word coming to us, most clearly so in baptism, that Word who also is Jesus Christ, gives us all that is his ("the Blessed Exchange") and takes all of our sin and brokenness himself. In giving us himself and all that is his, we have his love which is such that we, too, will give ourselves for our neighbors through the power of the Holy Spirit. "We conclude, therefore, that a Christian lives not in himself, but in Christ and in his neighbor...He lives in Christ through faith, in his neighbor through love. By faith he is caught up beyond himself into God. By love he descends beneath himself into his neighbor" (p. 309, Three Treatises). "In this is love, not that we have loved God but that he loved us and sent his Son to be the propitiation for our sins. Beloved, if God so loved us, we also ought to love one another" (1 John 4:10-11).

The fourth week I had to write a bit about "The priesthood of all believers" which we addressed at LCR in the fall Sunday School series on vocations.

Luther's concept "the priesthood of all believers" encompasses all who have been called to faith in Christ and share "one body and one Spirit...one Lord, one faith, one baptism, one God and Father of us all, who is over all and through all and in all" (Ephesians 4:4-6). We have different offices which "must benefit and serve every other...so that in this way many kinds of work may be done for the bodily and spiritual welfare of the community" (Three Treatises, p. 15). Depending on our particular office, we may cook meals, prescribe medicine, apprehend speeders, teach children, answer telephones, or offer the sacraments to God's people. Still, we all "are a chosen race, a royal priesthood...that [we] may proclaim the excellencies of him who called [us] out of darkness into his marvelous light" (1 Peter 2:9), pray for each other, offer God's forgiveness, and even baptize in his name.


