Pastor's Letter

November, 2015 "Renovation of the Sanctuary"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I'm looking at a clipping from the Waterville Morning Sentinel, Wednesday, September 14, 1966 that shows a "Ford Homes" flatbed truck and preassembled wall sections being unloaded. The concrete foundation had already been poured, the floor laid and wall and roof joists were already in place by the time the truck arrived from New York. The plan was to install the wall sections and close in the roof by the end of the same day. But a broken universal joint in a piece of the lifting equipment caused a two and a half hour delay. "By tomorrow night, however," said contractor Aime L. Veilleux of Winslow, "the church will be all closed in and a preliminary covering will be on the roof."

I'm looking at pictures of the cornerstone being set in place on the front of the building before the brickwork was laid. "1966." What an exciting time in the early life of this young congregation that must have been. There are a few 'slides' (*remember those?*) of Rev. Howard C. Moeller, the congregation's first pastor, standing in the finished sanctuary.

A lot has changed since then, but the sanctuary sure hasn't. It is remarkable how similar it looked then to the way it still looks today. It has served this congregation remarkably well for almost 50 years. As far as I can tell, the only attention it has received is a new roof, the floor has been refinished, new windows installed, the walls have been painted twice and the ceiling once. Amazingly, the carpeting is the original.

We are the grateful beneficiaries of some very wise planning and decisions and sacrifices that the founders of the congregation made a long time ago. But the time has come for our sanctuary to receive the kind of attention any 50 year old requires just naturally requires. Not to overdraw the analogy but there are some parts that were smooth but are now wrinkled and gray and there are a few age spots here and there. It's time to give this old gal some of the attention she deserves.

A group of 10 folks have been meeting since July to address the need for renovation of the sanctuary. Many ideas and thoughts have been brought to the table, some remain on the table and others have been eliminated. The committee's focus has been the sanctuary, but it has also taken on the renovation of the two downstairs bathrooms.

The goal is not to 'expand' or 'reconfigure' the current space at all, only to spruce up what is already there. We don't want this to become a 'big' project financially and are trying to confine it to what we are confident we can handle while continuing all the other important work we are doing.

Five different general contractors and many subcontractors have visited and offered their ideas on the best way to accomplish the goal. Some have taken measurements and submitted estimates. Here is an overview of what we're thinking so far:

- Remove the paneling on beams and replace with drywall and paint.
- Attach sheets of Styrofoam insulation to ceiling (either 2" or 4") and a white-wash stained pine board ceiling. (*Much improved energy efficiency, elimination of 'ice dam' in valley during winter, no chance of future 'nail or seam popping,' no painting*)
- Remove valence and lighting on side walls. Install energy efficient lighting ('LED') in

ceiling in each of four 'bays' between beams on each side of sanctuary. Spot and flood lighting on tracks to highlight cross, altar, pulpit, lectern, font. All with dimming capability.

- Repair and repaint walls.
- Replace carpeting.
- Replace communion kneeler in finished oak to match altar and font with 'kneeler' pads similar to current pew cushions.
- Replace front doors and entrance door to sanctuary.
- New speakers mounted into ceiling.
- New ceiling fans.
- Heat pump in balcony for cooling and heating.
- Downstairs bathrooms drywall, paint, new floors, ceilings, bathroom fixtures, lighting.

The timetable for all of this is as follows:

- Committee to mail final plans and estimate to the congregation by November 18, 2015.
- Question and discussion with Renovation Committee after worship on November 22nd.
- Approval of final plans at the Annual Voters Meeting on December 13th.
- Work to begin on January 2, 2016. Projected to take six weeks.
- "Renovation Pledge Drive" to begin on January 2nd through February 28th. The goal is to offset at least 50% of the cost of the project with 3-year pledges for the 'Building Fund.'

During the time of construction, we will hold worship services in the Fellowship Hall. Pews will be stored in room #201 which will also necessitate holding Adult Bible Study in the Fellowship Hall.

This is an exciting time for our congregation. Our goal is to be as wise and devoted and sacrificial as our forefathers were so that 50 years from now, another generation will look back on the work we did to maintain the sanctuary and thank us for providing such a wonderful place to gather for worship.

Current Projects:

Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter:

- Monthly Meals: Continue with the format in place. Deb Nielsen to provide suggested menu and oversee recruitment of volunteers. It can be the same menu from month to month.
- MMHS Capital Building Campaign: Resolve of the BfM that we should pledge \$5,000 towards the development of the 2nd floor of the Shelter for 'transitional housing' and 'training centers.' Funds to be allocated from balance at end of 2015 and remainder in 2016.
- Men's Clothing Drive: To kick off in January for delivery in February. There will be a logistical issue in the Fellowship Hall due to renovation of the Sanctuary during this time. Solutions to be investigated.

Hope Lutheran Church:

• Circuit #1 congregations are planning to pledge financial support to Hope for the calling of a full-time pastor. LCR will participate out of its 'missions' budget. Anticipated commitment is \$5,000 / yr. for five years.

Maine Children's Home:

- Andrea Watson to arrange / schedule for a team to work the Christmas program.
- Will try to arrange to have the new executive director visit the congregation.
- BfM voted to recommend \$1000 of mission funding go to Maine Children's Home for their Christmas program. Pastor will e-mail Church Council for their approval.

Guests and Visits for 2015/2016

• BfM would like to continue having local guests, mission speakers and seminary students visit the congregation. Pastor Nielsen will compile a list of possible 'mission speakers' for the next meeting.
