

"THE GOLDEN RULE OF PRAYER"

Intercessory Prayer
"So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets." Matthew 7:12

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I noticed that our Synod President was impressed with Rev. John Kleinig's presentation at a recent "Doxology" retreat. (See President Harrison's article in the October "Lutheran Witness.") I attended the same retreat last year in New Jersey and was also very impressed and moved by the profound thoughts presented by Rev. Kleinig. Over the next several months, I'd like to share some of these thoughts with you from his book, "Grace Upon Grace."

Kleinig asks, what is the very best thing that you, as a Christian, could ever do for another person? You may say, 'I could defend or befriend someone when they're in trouble.' And that would be a very good thing to do. You may reply, 'I could share my faith and tell them about Jesus.' That would also be a very good thing to do.

But Kleinig suggests something else that tops everything else that we, as Christians, can do for another person. We can pray for them. As children of God, we have access to the throne of grace in the name of Jesus Christ our brother. If someone is in trouble or lonely, we can take them to God in prayer, whether they are believers or not. Jesus makes it clear that unbelievers do not have access to God. "No one comes to the Father except through Me." (John 14:6). But we do. And when we pray for someone, we bring to God for divine help.

This gives new meaning to the Golden Rule. "So whatever you wish that others would do to you, do also to them, for this is the Law and the Prophets." (Matthew 7:12)

"The Golden Rule wasn't given by Jesus as a general ethical principle for all people, but as wise direction for God's children who have access to their heavenly Father though faith in Him. Since I am a child of God, I know that the best thing I could ever hope to receive from fellow Christians is their prayers. It's the greatest favor and kindness that they could ever show me. But the opposite is also true. By praying for God to forgive them when they sin, I show my love for them and for God. I therefore fulfill the Law and the Prophets when I don't pass judgment on others, but pray for them instead. I can ask our heavenly Father to supply others with what they lack. I can seek His grace for my sisters and brothers in Christ. I can knock at the door of my heavenly Father and bring them into His presence. So by the practice of intercession we fulfill the Golden Rule." (Kleinig).

"What should we do about the shortcomings and blunders of our brothers and sisters in Christ? Two approaches are common. On the one hand, there is the legalistic way. We can use God's Law to judge and condemn sinners. On the other hand, there is the permissive way. We can be lenient and overlook the fault in the hope that the power of the Gospel will change that person. Jesus warns us that where this is done something holy is desecrated and defiled.

He therefore advocates a third way, the way of intercession. The sins of our fellow Christians, their failures and their mistakes, the conflicts and tensions in a Christian community, are all

opportunities and occasions for intercession. Let me put it quite directly: When I fail as a pastor, I don't need your condemnation or your indulgence. What I need is your support, and you can give it best through your prayers." (Kleinig).

I so appreciate the women who meet at church every Wednesday afternoon to pray for me and the congregation. I would invite as many as would like to join them to do so. But I would also invite all of us to do the best thing that we can do as Christians, and that each of us can do even from our own homes - pray for one another.

The Feasibility Study Committee Report

At its meeting on March 28th, 2011, the Church Council voted to accept the proposal from Lewis and Malm Architects to conduct a feasibility study regarding an expansion of the church parking lot and sanctuary. On August 4th, Lewis and Malm met with pastor Nielsen, Glenn Carlson, Chris Batson and Eric Stout at the church to present their report. A thorough review of blue prints and cost estimates of a variety of options available revealed that both a parking lot expansion and sanctuary expansion are entirely feasible.

Three options for parking lot expansion were presented and three options for sanctuary expansion also presented. In reporting on the meeting to the Church Council at its meeting on September 19th, the committee recommended the following:

- The least expensive option for parking lot expansion was the most desirable option.
 This would involve adding to the existing lot by lengthening it along Cool St., expanding the current capacity of 35 cars to 59.
- 2. The least expensive option for sanctuary expansion was also the most desirable option. This would involve adding 14' to the sanctuary in the direction of the current chancel / altar expanding the seating capacity from 110 to 180.
- 3. It was recommended that these two projects should be undertaken in two phases; Phase #1 – parking lot expansion; Phase #2 – sanctuary expansion. The current parking capacity is inadequate for the current level of worship attendance. The hope is that excess parking capacity will contribute to increased worship attendance which will then require more worship capacity. The rough cost estimates for each project were almost equal.
- 4. It was further recommended that the concrete planning for Phase #1 should begin no sooner than 6 months before the current building mortgage is projected to be paid off. (The current mortgage balance is approximately \$75,000. In addition to the monthly payment, we have been contributing an average of \$1,400 per month towards the principle \$600 from the budget and \$800 from specified offerings. At this rate, the projected payoff is April, 2014, 7 years early!)

The Church Council accepted the recommendations of the committee and asked that the information be disseminated to the congregation for its reaction and input. Please speak to any of the Church Council members with any thoughts you have on this proposal for the congregation's future.

In the meantime, parking on Sunday mornings remains a problem that must be addressed now. We need to have at least 15 cars committed to park off-site on Sunday mornings. We are very concerned that the elderly and families with children are forced to park on the street. We are also concerned that visitors and guests find easy access to the building. Off-site parking is available at "Oak Grove Center" and along Cool Street and Matthew's Avenue.

Bring a dish to share with others. Pastor Nielsen will present a brief talk on a historical aspect of the Lutheran Reformation during lunch.
