Pastor's Letter

September, 2013

"For Students and Non-students"

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."
Romans 12:2

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It's back to school time. Summer vacation is over and classes have begun. I happen to know that regardless of the school you go to and regardless of the grade you're going into this year, there is one subject which every student will be taking, and it is "How to Handle Peer Pressure." I also happen to know that this one is one of the toughest lessons you will struggle to learn.

Listen to what St. Paul wrote about peer pressure. *"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect."* Romans 12:2

Peer pressure is the pressure we feel to conform to the pattern of this world. It's the pressure we feel to be accepted by others. We all want to be liked and like everyone else. How many times have we pleaded, "but everyone else is doing it" or said, "but everyone else has one"? But sometimes the "in-thing" is not God's thing. Sometimes God's way is not the popular way. We feel the pressure when we are forced to decide - "will I do the 'in-thing' or 'God's thing'?" Will I do what makes me like others or what is like the new person that God has made me through my Baptism? We fail the peer pressure class when we are more concerned about being conformed to the pattern of this world than we are with being transformed into the image of God.

Peer pressure is a powerful force. It can make us do silly things just to be accepted by our peers. A man named Peter and Jesus were good friends. Once Peter told Jesus, "**Lord, I'm ready to go with you to prison and to death.**" (Luke 22:33). But that was when Peter was in a room filled with other disciples and it was easy to fit in with a crowd who were all friends of Jesus.

Just a few hours after Peter said what he said to Jesus, Peter found himself in a totally different crowd of people. These people were not friends of Jesus. They asked Peter whether or not he was a friend of Jesus. And Peter felt the pressure. Peter wanted to be accepted by the crowd. He was afraid of being rejected by others. The pressure was so great that Peter denied His Lord and said, "**I don't know the man**" not once, not twice but three times. Peer pressure is powerful stuff.

In one way or another, we've all failed the peer pressure class. But the good news is this - YOU ARE FORGIVEN! And that's not just me talking - that's Jesus talking. YOU ARE FORGIVEN! Jesus was rejected and despised and hated just because He wanted to please God more than people. You see, we're not always very faithful friends of Jesus but He is always a faithful friend to us. He's taken all the punishment for your failure on Himself and paid the price on the cross.

Jesus has forgiven you for failing to handle peer pressure faithfully not once, not twice, not three times but 70 times 7 times. And your "F" has been erased and Jesus has given you His grade - "A+"! And you're mind has been renewed and you're ready to try hard to do what is 'good and acceptable and perfect.'

Board for Missions - Minutes of July, 9, 2013 Meeting

Attendance: Pastor Nielsen, Amanda Goldsmith, Andrea Watson, Michelle Hein, Avis Grant & Brian Watson. Pastor Nielsen opened the meeting in prayer.

Guest Speaker - 1st Choice Pregnancy Center - Waterville.



Wendy Merrill, a guest speaker with First Choice Pregnancy of Waterville gave a presentation to the BFM, providing an update on the status of the Center since temporarily closing last February due to water damages in their former location. She described the services that the Center provides to expectant and new parents. The center is moving to Penny Hill Park on Kennedy Memorial Drive at the end of July 2013. The center is currently open 2.5 days weekly with 12 volunteers.

They offer free pregnancy tests, choice counseling, prenatal and parenting classes, Bible classes, child birth classes and more. The center educates mothers-to-be of their options when they find they are pregnant unexpectedly, including parenting, adoption and abortion. First Choice's hope is that by educating women about abortion, they will choose life for their child. They do not condone abortion or support this as a viable choice. Gospel based support is available to those that have had abortions at any time in their life. Another of the center's focus is to bring the love of Christ to all that visit their center, while helping to prepare them to become parents. FC's annual budget is currently \$47,000, which is mostly to cover rent. They receive the majority of their funding from individuals and churches. The center is hoping to have more volunteers. Their board consists of six members. Wendy shared that many women, from all faiths and backgrounds, that consider abortion will follow through with this choice. However, when women are given the opportunity to have an ultrasound before making this choice, 50% choose life for their unborn child. With this in mind, FC's future goal is to provide free ultrasounds to pregnant women. FC estimates the cost of a new ultrasound is \$18,000 and Wendy said a fundraising campaign would be in their future for this. The center will need to have a stenographer to conduct the testing and a medical doctor to oversee the medical portion of the center. The most urgent need at this time for the center is a new laptop. The laptop they currently have is approximately ten years old. And volunteers are always needed.

Bd. For Missions Business

Brian suggested the board recommend to the Church Council a donation to the First Choice Pregnancy Center to purchase a new laptop and accessories. \$1,000 was suggested and the board unanimously agreed. Amanda was to contact Fernando and request a special Church Council meeting after church to seek the councils' approval of this donation. Avis offered to present it to the council.

The Board for Missions congregation request form is near completion. Michael Kiser is working on incorporating the "missions guidelines" on the back of the form before it will become available to the congregation.

Pastor Cundiff sent a thank you note to the congregation for the donation made to fund he and his wife journeying to Kenya for four months on a mission trip. Pastor Cundiff will be providing an email update on their mission trip. He also expressed interest in coming to Maine to talk to the congregation about their mission trip experience.

Pastor Nielsen suggested the BFM presenters from the current projects being funded come to adult Bible study and provide the same presentation given to the board. BFM board members were receptive and supportive of this idea.

Long-term Goals: Pastor Nielsen would like to strive to have a church member on the boards for the Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter, First Choice Pregnancy Center and the Maine Children's Home.

Missions Sunday - a tentative date of March 16, 2014 has been set. The board will have further discussions regarding Missions Sunday at future meetings.

Reports on Current Projects:

Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter: The congregation continues to participate in providing one meal monthly on Saturdays at the shelter. The following have signed up for meals.

The congregation received a thank you note from the MMHS for it's recent donation of \$1000. The letter is posted on the BFM bulletin board.

Maine Children's Home (Home for Little Wanderers): Brian visited MCH and met with Sharon Abrams regarding the renovations needed for one of their waiting areas. Brian said it mostly was in need of cleaning, painting, new carpeting and furniture. Brian said he is willing to head up the project and suggested the church's Sr. Youth Group participate in the project. He said he would look into furniture donations and will come to the board if funds are needed for the project.

Current Budget: Available funds for distribution were \$2,210.

The next BFM meeting is scheduled for September 4 @ 6:30 pm. There will not be a meeting in August.

An Update on Hope Lutheran Church - Bangor, Maine

At the end of August 2008, Rev. Hugh Pillsbury and Rev. Ted Evertsen began serving Hope Lutheran Church on an alternating schedule. At the beginning of Lent in 2009 Rev. Pillsbury had to discontinue his services for reasons of health. Rev. Evertsen began serving Hope on a weekly basis.

e had experienced a dramatic loss of members. When Rev. Pillsbury and Rev Evertsen began serving Hope attendance on Sunday was often only ten or twelve people. Attendance at the Adult Bible Class on Sunday morning was also low.

Finances, understandably, were in crisis. There was concern among the members that the church would be forced to close its doors and default on its mortgage. Thankfully, the New England District and Lutheran Church of the Resurrection have both been generous in their support, and Hope has been able to continue.

There has been a dramatic increase in worship attendance in the past year. Worship attendance is often in the mid to high 20's (attendance 6/30 was 24). Attendance at Sunday Bible Study averages about 14. Sunday morning Bible Study is continuing this summer with a review of Luther's Small Catechism for some prospective new members. The high attendance has continued. We are also planning a youth confirmation class beginning in the near future. The weekly offerings in the past few months have seen a marked increase. Some members have increased and even doubled their weekly offering.

Joshua Radke is leading a men's Wednesday evening study of Luther's Large Catechism. On Thursday evening a women's group is meeting for fellowship and study.

Hope has been donating food and personal care items to Manna Ministries in Bangor. The members have been generous in their support of this ministry. Also, we are assisting, with deposit

cans and bottles, a Lutheran pastor in Russia who is serving babies and children of women in prison.

In August Hope will have a table at the Bangor Arts Festival on the riverfront. We will be giving out free water and literature.

Each September Hope assists and helps Becky Reeve with the Multiple Myeloma 5K Race/Walk.

We invite members of LCR and the Board for Missions to come worship with us on a Sunday morning and see what is happening at Hope Lutheran Church. And please keep the church in your prayers.

Dear Members at Church of the Resurrection,

Thank you so much for your generous gifts to further my seminary education! Stacy and I were overjoyed to receive so much continual support, and it has certainly been very beneficial as we move from one stage of life to another.

There has been much going on again, which may be the trend in every letter I write. I had training with the Navy from May 11 to June 15 for Officer Development School (ODS) in Newport, RI. It started while I was still in classes for the 3rd quarter, so I actually completed 10 weeks of courses in 8 weeks. That by itself seemed to be a stretch of time and energy, but after the 3rd week in ODS, I realized that there are plenty of things that can keep you going when you are tired (like fear of having to do even more push-ups!)

Overall, ODS was a great experience and I met many other Chaplain Candidates from around the country. But immediately after training I traveled back to Fort Wayne to be a proctor for 21 high school students at Christ Academy High School at the seminary. It basically is a two week taste of the seminary for students considering the ministry, and they actually get to have seminary professors teach them. Still, it was tiring keeping track of all of them and I was happy to end the two weeks without any trips to the hospital. I then had ten days off to move from Indiana to Wisconsin, and I was installed at my vicarage congregation, Luther Memorial Chapel, on July 7th.

It has been a very busy couple of weeks here on vicarage, but Stacy and I are finally living together after having been married for 6 ½ months! That makes the hustle and bustle not seem bad at all, and we are really enjoying being in the same state and being able to eat dinner together more than once every two weeks! I'm really looking forward to my time here, from what I hear this is a great place to learn and work beside the pastor.

Rev. Joel Cundiff and His work with Capstone Ministries - Africa

What are we doing in Africa?



Every Monday Capstone hosts an outreach for street children. It is at the Capstone Youth Center or CYC for short. To get the boys to come, we provide soap and water so they can take a shower and wash their clothes. Some boys have gone over two weeks before their last bath. There is bread and juice for them, but not enough to satisfy their hunger. We don't want to make life too easy for them on the streets so that they would want to stay.

Here, the boys are away from the distractions of the street and we can give a Bible study and encourage them to go home to their families. The message today is about Shadrach, Meshach and Abednego and being thrown into a fire by the King (from the book of Daniel). When the King looks at the hottest part, he sees a fourth person, Jesus, who is protecting them and rescues them from the destruction of the fire. These boys are in the fire every day. Jesus has protected them from starvation, severe diseases and even death for this long. He now wants them to be rescued and return home to their families. When asked, "How many of you want to go home" four out of nine raise their hands, but they are just being polite to our request. These boys that came today have been on the streets for a long time, some over 11 years. They come with knife scars, aggressive attitudes and hardened exteriors. But, if you look long enough, you can catch a smile. They look Like men, but they are still boys at heart.

Why do these boys live on the streets? It's a different answer for each of them. Some like the freedom of not having to listen to anyone else but themselves. Some are lazy and don't want to work because their parents made them work at home on the farm. Some have family problems and don't want to go home. Others are addicted to sniffing glue, which makes them forget about their horrid situations. Most often, these boys are on the streets because of what the Bible calls "sin." Sin is the breakdown of relationships, with God, parents, friends and any other person in our lives. All their answers come back to broken relationships that need to be restored with forgiveness, the forgiveness that Jesus taught us. This is what Capstone does; it helps bring forgiveness and restoration so that street boys can return home to the families that love them. Today, there will be no boys returning to their homes. The only thing we can do for these boys is pray for them that God would protect them and lead them to want to go home in the future. The power of prayer works, but some times God is being patient. Last week God used Capstone to help rescue one child off the street. It doesn't sound spectacular by numerical standards, but it is exactly what Jesus meant when He said, "Suppose one of you has a hundred sheep and loses one of them. Doesn't he leave the ninety-nine in the open country and go after the lost sheep until he finds it? And when he finds it, he joyfully puts it on his shoulders and goes home. Then he calls his friends and neighbors together and says, 'Rejoice with me; I have found my lost sheep.' I tell you that in the same way there will be more rejoicing in heaven over one sinner who repents than over ninety-nine righteous persons who do not need to repent (Luke 15:4-7)." Give thanks to God for He is good! ~Joel

A Simple Sermon

A member of the church, who previously had been attending services regularly, stopped going. After a few weeks, the pastor decided to visit him.

It was a chilly evening. The pastor found the man at home alone, sitting before a blazing fire. Guessing the reason for the pastor's visit, the man welcomed him, let him to a comfortable chair near the fireplace and waited.

The pastor made himself at home but said nothing. In the grave silence, he contemplated the dance of the flames around the burning logs. After some minutes, the pastor took the fire tongs, carefully picked up a brightly burning ember and placed it to one side of the hearth all alone. Then he sat back in his chair, still silent.

The host watched all of this in quiet contemplation. As the one lone ember's flame flickered and diminished, there was a momentary glow and then its fire was no more. Soon, it was cold and dead.

Not a word had been spoken since the initial greeting. The pastor glanced at his watch and realized it was time to leave. He slowly stood up, picked up the cold dead ember and placed it back in the middle of the fire. Immediately it began to glow, once more with the light and warmth of the burning coals around it.

As the pastor reached the door to leave, his host said with a tear running down his cheek, "Thank you so much for your visit and especially for the fiery sermon. I will be back in church next Sunday."

We live in a world today, which tries to say too much with too little. Consequently few listen. Sometimes actions do speak louder than words.

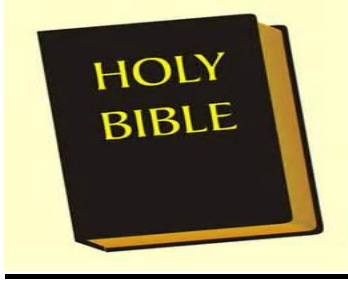
