Pastor's Letter December 2020

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

As a child, my favorite holiday of the year was always Christmas. Sure, I enjoyed the presents — what kid doesn't? But that wasn't the only reason I loved Christmas. Every part of the season surrounding Christmas was special, like making Christmas sweets. Two of my favorite sweets to make were what my family called "Reindeer Food" and "Candy Pizza" (the latter of which is basically diabetes waiting to happen). I loved the "Christmas spirit" that was always in the air. I also loved Christmas Eve and Christmas Day worship, when we would sing hymns like "O Come, All Ye Faithful", "Joy to the World", "Go Tell It on the Mountain", and many others.

There was something special about the Christmas season in my childhood—it gave me that feeling of being a kid in a candy shop (which, in some ways, I was!). But as I got older, one year in particular, all of that changed. That year was a difficult year of pain and loss. I remember looking forward to Christmas that year, hoping that the child-like feelings would return, but they never did. Christmas came and went, and it all felt like a blur. I remember thinking to myself how it didn't even feel like Christmas happened. I had been numb to it all.

If you've lived on this earth long enough, you've probably had a similar experience at Christmas time. Maybe you were entering the Christmas season for the first time after going through a divorce, maybe it was your first Christmas after the death of a loved one, or maybe you experienced a different kind of deep loss, and so you felt like you were just going through the motions of Christmas time, but your heart wasn't in it. You weren't feeling it. In fact, maybe you were feeling nothing more than pain and loss, and you couldn't wait for Christmas to be over. Or maybe this Christmas will be the first after a deep loss, and you're absolutely dreading it.

In a world so deeply driven by feelings and emotions, the message of Christmas—the birth of Jesus Christ—offers a different message:

Behold, I bring you good news of great joy that will be for all the people. For unto you is born this day in the city of David a savior, who is Christ the Lord (Luke 2:10-11).

This was the message of the angels to the shepherds on that first Christmas day, and it's a message that stays the same for you and me. Jesus is born! He has come to be your savior! This is good news of great joy! This joy is not dependent upon how you *feel* about it—it's objective truth. Christ is born. He has come to save *you*. And this good news meets you where you are.

What I'm trying to say is this: it's okay to feel pain this Christmas season. It's okay to feel numb. Pain is real. Loss cuts to the heart of each of us. We often feel that more acutely at Christmas. If you're grieving this Christmas season, let yourself grieve. If you're feeling pain, let yourself feel pain. But in the midst of the grief and pain that you might be feeling this Christmas season, I pray that you will cling to this good news—the objective reality that Jesus was born to be your savior. He came to this world because he loves you so much that he wants to spend eternity with you. Cling to this promise, especially when you don't feel it. Objective truth isn't dependent on your feelings. Jesus loves you. He came to this world to be your savior. This is truly "good news of great joy" that transcends the most fickle of our emotions. Thanks be to God that this good news of the Gospel is ours this Christmas!

Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

As we journey into this darker time of the year, we light candles, hang and place extra lights inside and outside our homes, pull out our advent wreaths, and look forward to celebrating the birthday of *the* light of the world. We greet another Advent season and the beginning of another church year with specific hymns, as well as moving to the use of Series B of the Three-Year Lectionary for our Sunday readings. Mark will figure prominently in the gospel readings instead of Matthew from which we have mainly heard this past year. But we will miss some of the traditions of many years...such as the LWML Christmas Fair (look for a Christmas in July fair next summer), and many of our Christmas parties and family gatherings will be much smaller due to the coronavirus.

Our Sunday Bible study narratives from the book of Exodus will remind us that we receive and enjoy all good things in this life as gifts from God — and that we should "fear, love, and trust in God above all things." We'll focus on God's provision of manna — food in the wilderness, and then how he gave water to his people from a rock (as we receive the water of life from our rock of salvation, Christ). Just before Christmas we'll consider how the people of Israel "set up their own god, to whom they looked for blessings, help, and comfort" (from Luther's Large Catechism) while Moses spent time with the Lord on Mount Sinai. We, too, often set up our own gods in which we trust instead of the Lord (including things like science, government, our healthy bank accounts...).

Our daily lectionary readings for December immerse us in portions of the prophet Isaiah who preached to his fellow countrymen of Judah regarding their lack of fear, love, and trust in the Lord. "...do not fear what they fear, nor be in dread. But the LORD of hosts, him you shall honor as holy. Let him be your fear, and let him be your dread. And he will become a sanctuary and a stone of offense and a rock of stumbling..." (Isaiah 8:12b-14a). Isaiah also embedded many promises of the Lord God within his sermons about the coming Messiah. The New Testament readings for the month primarily take us through the epistles from Peter and John, and a large portion of the Revelation to John. These address believers with warnings to be on guard against false teaching, assurance of the Lord's victory over sin and death, and the hope we have as a church together awaiting the new heaven and earth. We'll read accounts relating to Jesus's birth during the last week of the month until we reach Epiphany in January.

I tentatively plan to hold Saturday morning women's Bible studies on December 5 and 19. We may need to shift to a more computer based gathering if things continue to worsen in terms of the plague, but I hope to be at church those mornings from 8:30 to 10am in the fellowship hall downstairs. We've continued with the women in the Torah so far, but may change gears...let me know if you're interested or have recommendations for future studies.

Annual Congregational Meeting

The annual congregational meeting is scheduled for **Sunday**, **December 13**. Due to COVID-19, we will be making an adjustment to the usual way of conducting these meetings. In order to ensure that attendance is kept below the Governor's gathering limits, there will be two "sessions", one after each worship service. We hope that most members will attend the session following the service they attend. **Session 1 will begin around 9:30**, and will include a review of the annual reports, approval of the 2021 Budget, election of officers, proposed amendment to article 9 of the church constitution (see below), and a vote to officially call Pastor Akers as our Sole Pastor. A detailed agenda and meeting packet will be distributed prior to the meeting. After the agenda has been completed, the meeting will be temporarily suspended until **Session 2 resumes the meeting at around 11:45**. Session 2 will include the same agenda and voting as session 1, and will end with an official adjournment of the meeting when all business has been completed. We will make participation in the meeting through Zoom possible during Session 2. A link to this will be sent in the Friday announcement email on 12/11. Talk to Brian Watson, Pastor Akers, or any Church Council member if you have any questions or concerns.

Proposed Constitution Amendment: Remove existing **Article 9.0 - Right of Property in Case of Schism** and replace it with the following:

9.0 DISSOLUTION CLAUSE

If at any time a division or disagreement in the Congregation should take place for any reason, the following principles will govern in accordance with the dispute resolution process described in the bylaws of the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod:

- **9.1** The property of the Congregation and all benefits connected therewith shall remain with those communicant members who continue to adhere in confession and practice to the confessional standards set forth in Article 2.0 and Article 3.0 of this constitution.
- **9.2** In the event that the Congregation dissolves, all property shall be disposed of by the final voters assembly for the payment of debts and all just claims against the Congregation, and any and all surplus and all rights connected therewith shall be conveyed to and become the property of the New England District of The Lutheran Church Missouri Synod.
- **9.3** No members of the Congregation shall be entitled to share in the distribution of any of the assets in the event of the Congregation dissolving.

Christmas Eve & Christmas Day Worship:

We plan to offer two Christmas Eve worship services this year: 4:00pm and 6:00pm. We will celebrate the night of our savior's birth with a (slightly abbreviated) service of Lessons & Carols. As with Sunday morning worship, we ask that you RSVP in advance so we can ensure adequate space for all attendees. That survey will be sent out about two weeks in advance. We will be live streaming the 6pm service on Facebook for those who would like to participate from home.

Christmas Day worship will take place at 10:00am on Christmas morning. We will celebrate the Lord's Supper as a part of the Divine Service. **That service will be live streamed to Facebook as well.**

Defending the Faith

Sometimes the Best Defense is a good Defense.

Have you ever had a conversation with someone who had doubts about Christianity?

Perhaps it was a friend or family member who challenges Scripture as "just a book written by men". Or maybe they claim that Jesus was a wise person and a good teacher, but certainly not God.

Has a conversation like that left you flat-footed? Unable to come up with a quick response to their challenge?

This is where the field of Christian apologetics comes in.

Apologetics has nothing to do with apologizing. Rather, it is the practice of defending someone or something and in our case, it's defending the Christian worldview.

Going forward, I will be writing apologetics articles for our LCR monthly newsletter. My goal is to offer some of the different approaches to navigating conversations with agnostics, atheists and even Christians who are experiencing doubts.

My goal is to equip you for these conversations, both with methods of conducting them and with some of the best arguments against atheism and for Christianity. My hope is that you can approach these conversations with the confidence that comes from being well prepared.

I will be drawing on the expertise of some of the smartest theologians in this field and trying to make some very complicated concepts more understandable. Names like William Lane Craig, Greg Kokul, J. Warner Wallace, Frank Turek, and many more. And just to be sure I stay on track, I'll be doing this under Pastor Akers' supervision.

Here's a little taste... The "postmodern" view of the world (in which our young people are being indoctrinated from grade school through college) says that there is no such thing as absolute truth, meaning something that is true for all people, in all times and places and all circumstances. This is often used as an argument against the existence of God with statements such as "That's true for you but not for me."

Can you spot the place where this position fails? It actually falls on its own sword – and by the way, this is a conversation I actually had several years ago with a good friend. It went like this:

Him: "There's no such thing as absolute truth."

Me: "Is that absolutely true?"

My friend was making an absolute truth claim that there's no such thing as absolute truth. Fun, right? Luckily, I was prepared for that moment by years of study!



This family hopes to go through life with lots of adventures, stories, and laughs. They want to be able to spend every moment with family and friends with no regrets. This includes having adopted Rascal, a 3-year old dog from a high-kill shelter in Texas last year: Per DNA testing to determine his breed, it turns out that Rascal is 100%, unique, Mega Mutt!

When asked what advice they might pass along, they say, "Life is always good when you make it that way. It takes a lot of work to accomplish anything. Never stop working on your Faith, your Family, or Yourself." In particular, Seth shares, "Thank God, man is not judged from one day, but a lifetime!"
