### Pastor's Letter May 2023

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

The season of Easter in which we find ourselves for the month of May has a distinct and important structure. It is worth remembering, first, that in the church Easter is not primarily a calendar date, it is a season of the church year. We celebrate Easter for a full week of weeks (seven weeks) leading up to and culminating in Pentecost. There are three distinct parts of the Easter season: 1.) The celebration of our Lord's resurrection, 2.) The celebration of who our Lord is, and 3.) The anticipation of the Holy Spirit being poured out on Pentecost.

The first two weeks of the Easter season invite us to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord. As such, the Gospel Readings focus on the accounts of our resurrected Lord's appearances on and after Easter morning. If you pay attention closely, you noticed that the Gospel Reading on Easter Sunday (Mark 16:1-8) does not include the appearance of our Lord. We simply hear the announcement of an angel, but we do not see or hear from Him yet. This might strike us as an odd way to celebrate Easter Sunday. But for the early church, this was quite appropriate. After all, Jesus did not appear to the disciples until much later in the day. As such, we are invited to hear the announcement of His resurrection on Easter morning and joyfully anticipate His appearance to the disciples, in essence, re-living their experience. Historically, the church would not wait an entire week to gather again to hear of our Lord's appearance to the disciples. The Festival of our Lord's resurrection was historically celebrated with Divine Services every day of Easter week because our forefathers in the faith understood and found true joy in celebrating Jesus' resurrection. So, on Easter Monday and Tuesday, the account of our Lord's appearance to the Emmaus disciples and the rest of the disciples from Luke 24 is read. On Easter Wednesday, Jesus' appearance to the seven disciples at the Sea of Galilee (John 21:1-14) is read. On Easter Thursday and Saturday, Saint John's Easter account is read (John 20:11-18 and John 20:1-9 respectively). And on Easter Friday, Saint Matthew's account of the Great Commission is read (Matthew 28:16-20). This week of celebration beautifully anticipates our Lord's appearance to the disciples and the "Doubting Thomas" story (John 20:19-31).

As the third Sunday of the Easter season comes, we celebrate who our Lord is. He is *"the Good Shepherd [who] gives His life for the sheep"* (John 10:11). This "Good Shepherd Sunday" is one of the most beloved Sundays in the church year because we all love the beautiful Psalm 23 imagery. However, within the context of the Easter season, this third Sunday of Easter invites us to see our Good Shepherd as the one who lays down His life (John 10:15) so that He might take it up again (John 10:17) and give new life to us sheep who so often go astray.

The fourth Sunday of Easter marks the final turning point in this season, as we joyfully anticipate our celebration of Pentecost. Throughout these four Sundays, the text of John 16 is read one section at a time. Our Lord's words in this great chapter were as much intended to prepare His disciples for His death and resurrection as they were intended to prepare them for the coming of the Holy Spirit. And so, we join the disciples in learning from our Lord how the coming of the Holy Spirit to us is the culmination of His resurrection. He rose from the dead so that the same Spirit which raised Him from the dead might dwell in you (Romans 6:10-11). Notice that after we celebrate our Lord's Ascension with the reading of Mark and Luke's ascension accounts (Mark 16:14-20 and Acts 1:1-11), our prayerful expectation of Pentecost reaches its height as our Lord reminds us that the Holy Spirit comes to testify of Him (John 15:26).

Finally, the season of Easter culminates with the celebration of Pentecost. While we do read of the events of that first Pentecost from the book of Acts (2:1-21), our Gospel Reading for that day invites us to meditate on our Lord's words from John 14:23-31, where Jesus speaks of coming to make His home with us (John 14:23). This is what our Lord suffered and died for. This is why His resurrection is such good news for Christians. Our Lord has sent His Spirit to dwell with in us. He has made His home with us! This is the true joy of our Lord's resurrection. Alleluia!

## Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

I have been thinking of growing things recently, and of thorns and how they relate to our fallen world.

The Lord God cursed the ground because of Adam's disobedience, leading to its yielding of thorns and thistles. (Notice that neither Adam nor Eve is cursed, only the serpent and the ground...lots of hard consequences for the first couple and all mankind though!)

When the prophet Isaiah speaks of the people of Israel as a vineyard which has not produced fruit, he says that briars and thorns will grow in it, and it will be a waste. (Isaiah 7)

Jesus mentioned thorns in his parable about the sower and seeds—the thorns choke the growing seeds so that they do not bear fruit.

St. Paul wrote of having a thorn in his flesh which caused great suffering.

The gospel writers Matthew, Mark, and John let us know that the Roman soldiers twisted together a crown of thorns which they placed on Jesus' head before the crucifixion. I once cut my scalp on a large thorn and could not believe its profuse bleeding. Imagine how much Jesus bled from his head—and this *after* the scourging, and before the nailing to the cross. He literally wore an emblem of the curse as he went to his throne, the cross.

I *had* planned to hold two Saturday women's Bible studies in May, but due to the church work day scheduled for 5/13 (and the Walk for Life in Waterville on 5/20) I now think I will only hold one—on 5/27 from 8:30 a.m. to 10 a.m. in a downstairs classroom at church. We will continue to examine texts about the women we are encountering as we move through the scriptures following the schedule from Pastor Akers. If the portions we have been reading don't include named women, I entertain recommendations for other texts to study. Let me know if you'd like to join via a Zoom link and be included on my email list before each meeting. You are welcome to join in at any time! We enjoy the fellowship of sisters in Christ, and we also share prayer concerns with each other.

#### Defending the Faith Sometimes the Best Defense is a Good Defense

Talking with our LGBTQ neighbors and friends about Christianity can be hard. After all, both sides of this discussion have historically been adamantly and sometimes very loudly opposed to each other. There has been mutual anger and distrust between both sides.

I think that Jesus would show us a better way.

First, recognize that every gay person you encounter is a child of God and is loved by Him.

As you talk with someone in the LGBTQ community, it's important to get some baseline understanding into place.

First, we follow Sacred Scripture. It is our sole rule and norm for daily living. We hold it to be the inspired Word of God and therefore, 100% authoritative. You can expect that your LGBT friend won't share the same

foundation for their beliefs, but it's important that they know yours. You should also listen carefully to theirs as they express it.

One point to emphasize is that in modern day Christianity there seems to be a widespread belief that homosexual sin is worse than other sins. That belief is simply false.

In fact, Paul addresses this in 1 Corinthians 6:9-11 where he talks about those who will not inherit Heaven. Or do you not know that wrongdoers will not inherit the kingdom of God? Do not be deceived: Neither the sexually immoral nor idolaters nor **adulterers** nor **men who have sex with men** nor thieves nor the greedy nor drunkards nor slanderers nor swindlers will inherit the kingdom of God.

Adulterers (heterosexual) are right there in the same pile of sinners with "men who have sex with men". Sexual relations between unmarried heterosexuals are every bit as sinful as those between homosexuals.

Guess who else is in that pile of sinners? If you guessed you and me, you're right. We all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God! (Romans 3:23)

Every single one of us, gay or straight needs the grace given to us by our trust in Jesus.

So we stipulate that gay or straight, we're all sinners, we're all loved by God and we should love each other. (John13:34-35).

Does that mean that we should suddenly expect to perform same-sex weddings here at LCR?

Absolutely not. According to God's Word, marriage is to be between one man and one woman. For this reason, a man will leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife and the two shall become one flesh. (Gen 2:24)

Should our church (or any other faithful Christian church) be "open and affirming"?

Open and affirming is <u>half</u> right. We absolutely should be open to sinners of any kind, gay or straight. What we cannot do is affirm a sinful lifestyle, gay or straight.

How about temptation? Is it sinful to be tempted into sexual immorality? Well, it depends on what you do with that temptation. Temptation is common to every single one of us. Sometimes it's sexual. Sometimes it's greed. Sometimes it's gossip, lying or slander.

Temptation takes on lots of different forms – but take heart. *No temptation has overtaken you except what is common to mankind. And God is faithful; he will not let you be tempted beyond what you can bear. But when you are tempted, he will also provide a way out so that you can endure it.* (1 Cor 10:13).

So no, temptation itself is not a sin – but embracing it is. Fantasizing and letting your imagination run wild with that temptation – and Heaven forbid, acting on it? That's sinful.

When your gay friend (or straight friend) tells you that they still suffer sexual temptation, that verse can give strength and comfort. That's something they can latch on to for support, straight from God Himself.

With those baseline positions in place, we can talk with our LGBTQ brothers and sisters. We can talk about our non-negotiables (because they're dictated by Sacred Scripture) and then listen to what they have to say. It may be difficult, but it's a conversation worth having.

Next month, we'll talk about how to have those discussions, bearing in mind the second part of 1 Peter 3:15. *But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have.* **But do this with gentleness and respect**..." Genuine gentleness and genuine respect will go a long way.

"You sat in the beach chair with the Bible in your lap?"


"Absolutely."
