Pastor's Letter November 2022

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

November is a time of change. This is true in a worldly sense in a number of ways. We change the clocks on November 6. We experience the change in weather from the colorful beauty of fall to the dull cold of the approaching winter. Election day often marks a change in leadership. And we see a stark change from the gratitude of Thanksgiving Day to the consumerism of Black Friday and the "holiday season." The change is tangible.

November is also a time of change in the church. On Tuesday, November 1, we celebrate All Saints' Day. On November 20, we celebrate the last Sunday of the church year, which shifts our focus from the teachings of our Lord to an expectation of his return on the last day. The parametrs will change from white (on All Saints' Day) back to green and finally to blue (on the First Sunday in Advent) in the span of a month. The change is tangible.

During this season of change, I invite you to meditate on this Scriptural truth: "I the LORD do not change" (Malachi 3:6) and "You are the same, and your years have no end" (Psalm 102:27) and "Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever" (Hebrews 13:8). It's hard to imagine an existence without change. Our lives, in many ways, are founded on change. We are constantly changing. Everything that we experience changes us. We are a people constantly changing.

And yet, our Lord doesn't change. How can this be so? Well, it can be so because our Lord is wholly other than us. As the creator of all things, he is not subject to the whims and decays of time. He is above it all—the constant presence which holds the universe together.

In this fact that our Lord doesn't change, we Christians can take immense comfort. We are prone to change our minds and our opinions so easily. But when God reveals his character to us as "a God merciful and gracious, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness" (Exodus 34:6), we can have utter confidence that this will never change.

In the first verse of John 13, we read: "Now before the Feast of the Passover, when Jesus knew that his hour had come to depart out of this world to the Father, having loved his own who were in the world, he loved them to the end" (John 13:1). That's quite a statement to say that he loved them to the end. But because we have a God whose character does not change, it doesn't matter that we haven't reached the end yet. "His steadfast love endures forever", as the famous refrain of Psalm 136 puts it.

My friends, during this season of change, you can be sure of one thing. You will never have to guess where you stand with God. His love for you was demonstrated definitively in Jesus, who died for your sins so that your debt might be paid and that you might be guaranteed an eternal home. For those of us who believe in him, this reality will never change. Thanks be to God!

Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Before the end of this month we will reach the end of another church year and begin a new one with Advent. What blessings we receive as we go through these church seasons repeatedly!

Our next portions of <u>The Book of Concord</u> also have to do with things repeated—the *Small Catechism* and the *Large Catechism*. They both actually predate the *Augsburg Confession*. Luther published them in 1529, the year prior to the confession. The word "catechesis" means "a teaching,", but it derives from a Greek word, *katecho* that originally had the sense of speaking by mouth—or re-sounding, echoing. We always return to these teachings and strive to know them well (or even by heart), as they summarize the Christian teachings of scripture.

Martin Luther's prefaces to these two catechisms explain his purpose and motive for writing them. In visiting various churches, he observed that most parishioners didn't even know or understand the basics of their faith, what we call the six chief parts: The Ten Commandments, the Creed, The Lord's Prayer, The Sacrament of Holy Baptism, Confession, and the Sacrament of the Altar. He urged pastors, preachers, heads of households, and all Christians to learn and study these catechisms and the Bible itself. We still need to do so!

This month I think we will only have one Saturday morning women's Bible study, because of the Thanksgiving holiday. Right now each session contains a "stand-alone" study, so feel free to join any day you might like to do so. We will meet at 8:30 a.m. on November 12 for about an hour and a half. You can also join via a Zoom link which I can send if you let me know you'd like to do that.

Defending the Faith.

Sometimes the best defense is a good defense.

"Why do you Christians insist on telling this "creation" fable, when evolution explains everything?"

This is Part 1 of a 3-part series...

We hold to certain beliefs that can be called the Christian worldview. Hopefully, we hold that worldview not because Mom, Dad and the Pastor said so - but because it's true.

How do we know? Sure, we take some things on faith. But in others, there's evidence and it's more than sufficient - at least for those who are not fanatically dedicated to denying it.

So when you're in a discussion about creation vs evolution, you have to ask a question. What do you mean by "evolution"?

The reason you need to ask that question is that the term can be used in a number of different ways. In some ways, we should be in complete agreement with the atheist!

In the strictest sense of the word, evolution is simply change over time. In that sense, our coastline evolves as a result of wave action. Mountains evolve due to the collision of tectonic plates and erosion by weather. Organisms change as a result of external forces - like bacteria developing resistance to antibiotics.

Nobody disputes these examples of evolution. They are clearly verifiable and repeatable and they are not the slightest bit anti-Christian.

But evolution of one <u>species</u> into another species is an unproven theory - and it's one that is often used by atheists to try to disprove the existence of God and His work in creating the universe. This is where we part company with the atheist.

Let's address just three points in this series of articles. There are many more ways to confront the evolutionary atheist proposition on this topic, but these three are so powerful in their own right that you may not need to go further.

This month, we'll address the origin of life.

This one is easy. Darwinists and atheists simply have no viable explanation for "first life". There are competing theories about how life sprang from non-life, but <u>none</u> rise to the level of plausibility.

For example, Biochemist Robert Shapiro has summarized the "primordial soup" theory in its "mature form" as follows:

- 1. The early Earth had a chemically reducing atmosphere. (This is more chemistry than I'm comfortable explaining but let's grant it to the atheist, just for the sake of discussion)
- 2. This atmosphere, exposed to energy in various forms, produced simple organic compounds.
- 3. These compounds accumulated in a "soup", which may have been concentrated at various locations (shorelines, oceanic vents etc.).
- 4. By further transformation, more complex organic polymers and ultimately life developed in the soup.

I hope you noticed the massive leaps of faith in steps 2 and 4!

In step 2, Atmosphere + energy = organic compounds.

In step 4, "further transformation" caused life to develop in the "soup"

Further transformation?? Seriously?? That's the best you can do, Mr. Atheist?

Many of the atheist attempts to explain the origin of life have enormous gaps that get filled in with what amounts to "andthensomethinghappened" (See? It sounds good if you say it fast)

Many may still point to the famous Urey-Miller experiment. This was a lab experiment performed in 1953 where two scientists (Urey and Miller) attempted to create amino acids (the supposed "building blocks" of life) in a test tube by combining gases that they assumed existed in the primordial earth with a lightning simulation.

While they did indeed form amino acids, this experiment has been discredited because it neither simulated the early atmosphere (wrong gas mixtures) nor lightning (they used continuous current, not short, massive jolts of extremely high current and voltage).

But let's be more than charitable to the scientists and say that the experiment was completely successful. Let's say that they did create amino acids in a test tube that really did simulate primordial earth. What did they accomplish?

First, all they did was to create a complex acid - they never even remotely approached the creation of <u>life</u>. At this point in history, the most advanced scientific method cannot even create a living blade of grass.

Second, Urey-Miller proved that an intelligent designer who could rigidly control conditions could create amino acids. We know that "intelligent designer" as God. Have fun pointing that out to your atheist friends. The challenge is to do it <u>graciously</u> when deep down inside, you picture yourself laughing as they realize that they have painted themselves into a corner.

Perhaps this is best summed up by a story.

One day a scientist said to God, "That's it. We don't need you anymore. We now know how to create life"

God replies "OK, let's see what you can do" The scientist says "It's easy. You start with some dirt..." God interrupts and says "Hold on - let's see you make your own dirt!"

Stay tuned for next month's installment, "A complete hostility to life!"
