

Pastor's Letter September 2023

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

You cannot truly love Jesus if you do not love His Church.

Many people claim to be Christians who love Jesus, yet they do not love the Church. They avoid church. They claim to commune with God in nature, so who needs an organized institution? Or then there are those who hold membership in a church, but they believe that the fullness of the Christian life is found when it's just "me and Jesus." So, they sit at home with their Bible, and they listen to their praise music thinking that they truly love Jesus. But to love Jesus in any of these ways is to not truly love Him. Imagine a wife who does not love her husband's body. Can such a wife be said to truly love her husband? Of course not! Neither can a person love Jesus without loving His Church.

The Church is the body of Christ. In fact, our Lord Jesus Himself goes so far as to identify the Church <u>as</u> Himself. In the early part of the book of Acts, Saul (the man who would come to be known as the Apostle Paul) was persecuting the Church: "As for Saul, he made havoc of the church, entering every house, and dragging off men and women, committing them to prison" (Acts 8:3). But when the Lord Jesus confronted Saul on the road to Damascus, He said this: "Saul, Saul, why are you persecuting <u>Me?</u>" (Acts 9:4). When Saul persecuted the Church, he persecuted Christ Himself. The Church is Christ. Or, as the New Testament states it more regularly, the Church is the body of Christ (see Romans 12:4-5, Colossians 1:24, Ephesians 5:29-30). And if the Church is Christ's body (and it is), then one cannot truly love Christ without loving His body, the Church.

When you love someone, it changes you—the way you spend your time, your priorities, and your desires. A young couple who has fallen in love desires nothing more than to be together. An old couple who has been married for 50 or 60 years can't bear the thought of being apart—even in death. If you truly love someone, you want to be with them—in the body. Since the Church is the body of Christ, those of us who claim to love Him must allow that love to change us such that our desire is to be with Christ's body, our priority is to be with His body, our time is spent with His body. If we truly love Christ, that love will manifest itself in a life that revolves around opportunities to be with His body, the Church.

With the new academic year coming upon us, now is as good a time as any to re-orient your priorities. If you love Jesus, but you don't find yourself at church every week, then now is as good a time as any to make time in your calendar to do so. If you love Jesus, but you don't make it a priority to attend Bible studies or Fellowship time, it's not too late to rearrange your schedule to prioritize time with Christ's body. If you find your Sunday mornings too busy or stressful to come to church, then perhaps this is a warning that your love for soccer, dance, or time at camp has surpassed your love for Jesus. If you're too tired on a Sunday morning to get out of bed in time to be at church, then perhaps this is a warning that your love for your work or your social life has surpassed your love for our Lord Jesus.

Our Lord said to His disciples: "I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing" (John 15:5). This is the blessed news of the Church. When we walk through the doors, when we gather with our brothers and sisters in Christ around the Scriptures in study, around the Word and Sacraments in the Divine Service, or in discussion at the Fellowship table, we are with the body of Christ. Jesus is there. In the study, in the service, and, yes, at the Fellowship table, you are with Christ because you are with His body. Abide in Him. He desires to give you more abundantly that you could ask or imagine through the continual gift of His presence. Apart from Him you can do nothing.

If you truly love Jesus, you will love His Church. Jesus truly loves His Church: "As the Father loved Me, I also have loved you; abide in My love" (John 15:9).

Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR.

Where do you meet up with people who live in your town or area while obtaining things you need regularly in daily life? Grocery stores and gas stations come to mind for me. In scripture we see that community wells served such a purpose. We all need water of course, but nowadays we either have wells at our own homes or lines of water from a public supply.

Some notable events took place at wells. Disagreements about who could use certain wells did occur, but the more intriguing encounters included:

Abraham's servant met Rebekah in answer to prayer that he might find the wife for Isaac.

Jacob met Rachel and soon after that, her sister Leah, who both became his wives.

Moses, when he fled Egypt and Pharaoh for Midian, sat down by a well and there he met the daughters of the priest of Midian, one of whom (Zipporah) became his wife.

All three of these men had journeyed some distance from home when they went to these wells.

Jesus, too, met a woman at a well in Samaria—an area considered foreign to most Jews. He sat down at the well of Jacob, no less. While that encounter did not lead to a wedding—the woman he had encountered had already had five husbands—in another sense it did foreshadow a kind of marriage to come. Jesus offered the woman living water, and alluded to the salvation coming in that gift. As St. Paul notes in Ephesians, husband and wife mysteriously refer to Christ and his church, the Bridegroom and his Bride. This church of Christ includes believers from all nations, not only the chosen people through whom our Lord descended and became incarnate.

During September, I plan to hold women's Bible studies on Saturday mornings of 9/2, 9/16, and 9/30. We meet at 8:30 in downstairs room 104 until about 10. I can also provide a Zoom link, should you like to join us by computer. We have been studying passages involving various women in the scriptures as we "Read the Bible in Two Years."

Defending the Faith.

Sometimes the Best Defense is a Good Defense.

Where did **FIRST** life come from?

Atheists and naturalists throw around lots of ideas about how the building blocks of life "somehow" came together in one place at the same time and then "something" happened.

Those building blocks are things like amino acids, various proteins, nucleotides, nucleic acids, sugars, lipids and many others.

Theories of how they formed include everything from random mixtures of primordial gases to deep sea thermal vents to clay helping to form crystalline structures to aliens.

Yes, aliens. (It's amazing just how far atheists will go to avoid God!)

The proper name for the latter theory is "panspermia". In one version, some posit that actual alien beings brought life to earth. (This solves nothing, of course. They still haven't explained where that alien first life came from). In another, they propose that the building blocks of life came here by way of comets and meteorites and then "something" happened.

There's a lot of "and then something happened" when atheists try to explain first life.

A famous atheist and scientist, Fred Hoyle calculated the odds of the 2,000 or so amino acids coming together at random to be 1 chance in 10^{40} . That's 10 followed by 40 zeroes. In other words, mathematically impossible.

Of course, even if you managed to get those amino acids together, you don't have life. You just have amino acids.

Here's something to ponder. I know where you can find every single building block of life.

Every dead plant and animal on the planet has all of those building blocks, all in one place.

By the naturalist's theory, we should find all sorts of new life springing up from that flat, dead skunk on the side of the road. Of course, that never happens because you need more than just the ingredients.

Gathering all of those ingredients together and expecting new life to spring up is like putting flour, yeast, salt and water on the kitchen table and expecting bread to appear by itself. There's something more to it and we know that "something more" is God – the author of life!

It's hard for them to kick against the goads...
