Pastor's Letter

April, 2019



"As Jesus was going up to Jerusalem, he took the twelve disciples aside, and on the way he said to them, 'See, we are going up to Jerusalem. And the Son of Man will be delivered over to the chief priests and scribes, and they will condemn him to death and deliver him over to the Gentiles to be mocked and flogged and crucified, and he will be raised on the third day." Matthew 20:17-19

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The captain of the ship looked into the dark night and saw faint lights in the distance. Immediately he told his signalman to send a message: "Alter your course 10 degrees south." Promptly a return message was received: "Alter your course 10 degrees north." The captain was angered; his command had been ignored. So he sent a second message: "Alter your course 10 degrees south - I am the captain." So another message was received: "Alter your course 10 degrees north - I am seaman third class Jones." Immediately the captain sent a third message, knowing the fear it would evoke "Alter your course 10 degrees south - I am a battleship." Then the reply came: "Alter your course 10 degrees north - I am a lighthouse."

In the midst of our dark and foggy times, many voices shout orders at us, telling us what to do and how to set the course and direction for our lives. Out of the many voices, one voice says something quite contrary to all the rest - something even absurd. But the voice happens to be the Light of the Word, and we ignore it at our peril.

In the 20th chapter of St. Matthew's gospel we read that the captain of the ship of salvation announces to His crew that they are on a collision course with the cross - not so they might change course and avoid it, but so that they might be prepared for it when it happens. Eventually, just as the captain forewarns, the collision occurs. Even though the crew was still not ready for it, only one dies - the captain himself.

If you've ever been in a collision, you know what a crisis this is. Even a little fender-bender can leave you shaking and rattled. As the disciples collided with the cross of Jesus, it left them permanently changed men.

It is in this encounter with the cross of Jesus Christ that we are changed also. There, we see the terrible toll our sin has taken, not only on us, but on our Lord, and it ought to leave us shaken. It is at the cross that we see ourselves for who we really are; sinners, so loved by God that He would send His only Son to bear the awful punishment which we all deserve. That's enough to change a person, or at least it should be.

Notes from your Deaconess

April, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Every year at specific times, we recall births, baptisms, wedding anniversaries, deaths, significant moves or events—whether wonderful or disastrous. Ecclesiastes reminds us that "To everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven" (3:1). Shakespeare writes of seven ages in a man's life in his play "As You Like It." Through our church year we focus on different portions of Jesus' life as we move through the Times of Christmas, Easter, and the Church (see *Lutheran Service Book*, p. 10). In our journey through the *LSB*, we come next to the rites for Baptism, Confirmation, and Holy Matrimony, followed by a full service outline for Funerals (pages 268 through 281).

The first three of these most often occur within a longer service, but may also be used as a very brief service in themselves. Each of these three rites commences with a statement from the Pastor of the reason and need for the event, particularly for the individual or individuals for whom this work by God is being done. In Baptism, the individual dies with Christ and is brought into new life—at a specific time and place with God's word, His work using water and faith. We were buried therefore with him by baptism into death, in order that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, we too might walk in newness of life. (Romans 6:4) Baptism...now saves you. (1 Peter 3:21a) In Confirmation, the Pastor asks individuals to give voice to their faith—which they do by the power of the Holy Spirit. Whoever confesses that Jesus is the Son of God, God abides in him, and he in God. (1 John 4:18)...And no one can say "Jesus is Lord" except in the Holy Spirit. (1 Corinthians 12:3b) The confirmands verbally witness to the rest of Church body present. The rite of Holy Matrimony joins a man and woman in marriage, a union established by God (although not one in which all persons are able to participate), and which gives a visible representation of the relationship of Christ and his bride, the Church (in which all believers do participate). See Ephesians 5:22-32.

The Funeral service begins with Pastor *and* congregation affirming that the individual who has departed from this world's life now sleeps (in our view) to await the resurrection of the body, as promised by our Lord to whom this one already had been united by their baptism. The service itself, which can include Holy Communion if the family and Pastor so choose, otherwise follows the usual order for a service of the Word with scripture readings, statements of faith, and prayers. These all affirm for those who remain that their loved one has been taken to his or her heavenly home, and now has entered fully into life. See 1 Corinthians 15:51-57 and 2 Corinthians 5:1-8.

During the first week of April we will complete Genesis in our lectionary readings, reading how the Lord used Joseph to save his family which had sold him into slavery. The rest of the month we will read from Exodus, including the calling of Moses as chosen servant for leading Israel out of Egypt, about the first Passover during Holy Week, and the beginnings of the journey through the wilderness. We will finish reading the gospel of Mark just before Holy Week, followed by the entire letter to the Hebrews, and begin the gospel of Luke at the very end of the month. (Come join the Thursday morning Bible studies with Pastor after Easter for insight into the letter to the Hebrews.)

I intend to hold Saturday morning women's Bible studies on April 13 and 27. Come meet with some sisters in Christ for a time of fellowship, reading scripture together, and sharing prayer concerns.

Some helpful habits for home devotions:

- Do one reading in the morning and the other in the evening.
- Keep a journal or make a mental note of one thought that you would like to remember from this reading.
- Read and discuss the daily reading with a family member or friend.
- Choose one verse to commit to memory, reciting it through the day.
- Speak to God in prayer about something from the reading that impressed or confused you in this reading.
- If you miss a day or two (or three) and fall behind, don't worry and don't quit! Either set aside some time to catch up or skip those readings and move on.
- If you're using another reading schedule or guide, stick with it. The important thing is to be in the Word daily.
