Pastor's Letter

December, 2019 Advent is the time to prepare the way of the Lord.

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Church's season of Advent is a time to prepare. But the question that we wrestle with during this season is always, 'prepare for what?' 'What are we to be prepared for?'

Retailers have an answer for that question. 'Prepare to buy everything that money can buy.' But the Church has a much different answer to that question. Jesus Christ is coming into the world - not born of a virgin named Mary or hidden away in a manger in a stable in a little town called Bethlehem. It's hard to prepare for something that already happened 2000 years ago.

He is coming again. And when He does, it will NOT be to die for your sins and be raised for your justification. Once is enough for that. "Christ died for sins, once for all, the righteous for the unrighteous." When He comes again, it will be to judge the living and the dead. See if that doesn't give your Christmas season a new perspective. This is what the Church's season of Advent wants to prepare us for.

Peter says that "the day of the Lord will come like a thief." Paul says, "For you are fully aware that the day of the Lord will come like a thief in the night." (1 Thess. 5:2). Where would Peter and Paul get the idea to compare Jesus to a thief? From Jesus actually! Jesus warned His disciples, "stay awake, for you do not know on what day your Lord is coming. But know this, if the master of the house had known in what part of the night the thief was coming, he would have stayed awake and would not have let his house be broken into." (Matthew 24:42-43)

So what are we to think of this? We burglar proof our homes against thieves from breaking in and stealing from us. Are we to burglar proof our lives so Jesus cannot break in and get at us and steal from us what is rightfully ours? CERTAINLY NOT! For what is rightfully ours is sin and death. Like a thief, this heavenly burglar comes to steal what belongs to us. He comes to take away all of our sins. He intends to clean us out, rob us blind and leave us with nothing left to call your own. And when He's through with His divine thievery, the only thing you'll be left with is what He leaves behind and what is His. And what is His is righteous and holy. And He leaves the Holy Spirit.

Sad to say, we don't want Jesus to take what is ours. We hold tightly onto what is ours and guard it with our life, sometimes, even to the point of death. We'll do anything to prevent this cosmic break in from taking place.

And we're not just talking about a spiritual break in but a material break in as well. Everything that money can buy will be taken away from us. Everything that we have horded for our future suddenly gone, the whole thing, dissolved in His coming to separate us from what separates us from complete trust in Him. And so the season of Advent is all about preparing for Christ's coming by repenting.

"The day of the Lord will come like a thief." Tis the season for preparing. We worship, listen to His Word, we repent, we receive His Supper and we pray, until we're read to cry out, "Even so, come Lord Jesus!"

Notes from your Deaconess

December, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

We begin once again our journey into and through the Advent season. In this month of darkness and chill, we prepare ourselves for the coming of our King. During this first part of the church year, we focus particularly on our Lord's future coming to judge all nations. Yet we also anticipate our celebration of his coming into this world as one of us, a baby in Bethlehem, and recognize and rejoice in his sacramental coming to us weekly through the Word combined with water, bread and wine.

We have over two dozen hymns particularly designated for this Advent season with four Sundays, and almost *three* dozen Christmas hymns which we try to squeeze into the dozen days (usually three or four worship services) of the Christmas season. So sing them at home if we miss your favorites at church!

One of the Advent hymns, "O Savior, Rend the Heavens Wide" (LSB 355), contains seven prayerful verses of petition which refer both our Lord's first coming, and his second coming which we look for in these dark and confusing days. A greater urgency runs through this text than in the more familiar "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" (LSB 357), although the longing to see God's work comes through clearly in both. Written in the early seventeen century during the Thirty Years War, and with a tune from a few decades later, we sing to God as our Savior, Father, our fount of hope, and morning star. There are allusions to scriptural texts from the prophet Isaiah and gospel of Luke.

O Morning Star, O radiant Sun, When will our hearts behold Your dawn? O Sun, arise; without Your light We grope in gloom and dark of night. (v.5)

We began to read the prophet Isaiah in our daily lectionary readings a few days ago. This hope-filled book contains a great many passages which apply to Jesus. They both comfort and admonish the readers to prepare for his coming—in the flesh as our redeemer, and at the end as judge to right all wrongs. The New Testament readings include the letters of Peter, John, and Jude as well as more of the Revelation to John. These all address believers with warnings to be on guard against false teaching, assurance of the Lord's victory over sin and death, and the hope we have as a church together awaiting the new heaven and earth. From Christmas Day until the end of December we will read Matthew's and Luke's accounts related to the Nativity.

This month I do not plan to hold any Bible studies. Our annual Christmas fair will be held on the first Saturday (12/7) for much of the day, and I hope you can make it over to church either that day, or to help with setup in the previous few days. The second Saturday the LWML Ladies Christmas luncheon out will take place—which I plan to attend and hope to see many of you there. Then we'll be closing in on Christmas and New Year's Day, so I thought that lives would likely be too busy. Have a blessed month and I'll see you in church!

OFFICIAL ANNOUNCEMENT OF PROPOSAL TO AMEND THE BY-LAWS

AMMENDMENT TO THE CONGREGATION'S BY-LAWS

The Elders of the Congregation will propose an amendment to the By-Laws as follows, for approval at the Annual Voters Meeting:

Article 5: Calling of a Pastor or Teacher

(Current wording to be retained) The election and calling of a pastor or teacher shall take place in the following manner: Any congregational member may submit the name(s) or candidate(s) to the Board of Elders for consideration. The Board of Elders will consult with the president of the Synodical District for additional candidates for the pastorate or office of teacher. A list of candidates shall be proposed to the voting members at their next regular meeting or a meeting especially called for that purpose. The voting members shall by secret ballot adopt a list of candidates and such list shall be publicly announced. Thereafter the voting members meeting in regular or special session shall elect one of the proposed candidates by ballot and by simple majority. (Proposed addition to the above) The Board of Elders may propose calling a candidate from one of the LCMS seminaries or who have satisfied the qualifications and requirements for assignment of first call.

Dear Brothers and Sisters of Lutheran Church of the Resurrection,



Some helpful habits for home devotions:

- Do one reading in the morning and the other in the evening.
- Keep a journal or make a mental note of one thought that you would like to remember from this reading.
- Read and discuss the daily reading with a family member or friend.
- Choose one verse to commit to memory, reciting it through the day.
- Speak to God in prayer about something from the reading that impressed or confused you in this reading.
- If you miss a day or two (or three) and fall behind, don't worry and don't quit! Either set aside some time to catch up or skip those readings and move on.
- If you're using another reading schedule or guide, stick with it. The important thing is to be in the Word daily.
