Pastor's Letter

February, 2018 "Who Are You?"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In Arthur Miller's famous play, "Death of a Salesman," the main character, Willie Loman spends his whole adult life trying to find satisfaction and fulfillment. For Willie, satisfaction and personal fulfillment are measured by the people he is able to impress and by the number of people he dreams will turn out for his funeral. "Why when I die," he says to his son, Biff, "there will be hundreds of people at my funeral." "Dad," Biff replies, "you don't have to do this.

The final scene of the play takes place in a funeral home. It's Willie's funeral and only a small handful of people are present. The casket is open and Willie's wife comes forward and places a few flowers on his casket. She says, "Willie, I made the last payment on the house today, Willie." And then she turns to her son Biff and says, "You know, all he needed was just a little more salary." But Biff replies, "Nah, he never knew who he was."

How about you? Are you looking for satisfaction and fulfillment for your life, and if so, where are you looking? Willie Lohman sought fulfillment in the acceptance and admiration of others. Willie's wife thought that all Willie needed was a little bit more money, then he would have been satisfied. We can look at ourselves in relation to the world around us and see all kinds of things that beg us to say, "if only..." "If only you had this or if only you didn't have that. Then you'd be satisfied, then you'd have a meaningful and fulfilling life."

When St. Paul writes to the Ephesians, he writes to people who HAVE IT ALL! "Blessed be the God and the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places..."

Wow! You may not have every earthly blessing there is. If you try to define yourself by the earthly blessings you possess you will probably never be satisfied because there's always more and better out there that you don't have and probably never will. But as one who is "in Christ," you have every spiritual blessing, the forgiveness of all your sins, life, eternal life and the deepest satisfaction and fulfillment of all – you are accepted and loved by God.

Who are you? You are in Christ, blessed with every spiritual blessing in the heavenly places. That makes us very rich people. We may not have the riches and success or the recognition of others, but we are someone for whom God Himself suffered death on a cross for. We are someone for whom He rose from the dead for. We are someone who God has made heirs of the riches of the Kingdom of God. If this is the way we would take the measure of our life, how can we be anything but satisfied and content with our life? Frankly, this is the way God takes the measure of our life.

To know who we are "in Christ," casts a whole new light on our identity in relation to the world. We can be done with making all of those comparisons to others who seem to be so happy and have it all together according to their Facebook or Instagram page. In Christ Jesus, we are blessed, chosen, redeemed. We are children of God.

Notes from your Deaconess *February*, 2018

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

This month we will begin the Lenten season, our annual lengthy time (forty days) of preparing ourselves for our Lord's passion, death and resurrection. After Epiphany and its "Aha!" moments realizing who Jesus truly is, in Lent we ponder our need for him that we may joyfully receive what he freely has given us, and what he prepares for us.

In our journey through the Divine Service, we pause to consider the **Words of Institution** (or *Verba* from Latin). Every time we celebrate the Lord's Supper we hear from the Pastor these words of our Lord, found in the first three gospels and also in St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. These words spoken at the Last Supper which Jesus shared with his disciples, a Passover meal, ushered in a new reality as Jesus took bread, blessed, broke, and gave it to his disciples, telling them to take and eat—for it was (and would be) his body broken for them. He also took the cup of wine, blessed and shared it with them all, telling them to drink this, his blood of the new covenant.

That first Passover in Egypt, each family of the people of Israel had consumed the flesh of a male lamb and used its blood to mark their homes to protect them from the "Destroyer of the firstborn" (Hebrews 11:28). In this new covenant Jesus, the only begotten son of the Father, gives his flesh and blood for his people to consume, be rescued from sin, death and the devil.

We believe that God's word does what it says, and we believe that Jesus is God incarnate. So here we receive the food which is Jesus himself, which transforms and restores us. We also see this spiritual meal as food for the journey, like the manna provided for the people of Israel in the wilderness, which our Lord provides when we gather together around His table and He serves us through our pastor.

Right now I plan to have Saturday morning women's Bible study meetings on the second and fourth Saturdays—February 10 and 24. These are informal times of fellowship, reading scripture together and seeing what God is saying to us through the word. Questions and suggestions for study are certainly welcome. We have mainly read accounts of many different women in the Bible, and still have not exhausted the possible individuals who could be considered. Hope to have you join me!

During the first couple of weeks of February, the daily lectionary readings turn our attention to the book of Job in the Old Testament, and the gospel of John in the New Testament. While the season of Epiphany focuses on the revelation of who Jesus is for the world, Job struggled with the hidden ways of God's work specifically in his life. His "comforters" confidently and erroneously explained the reasons for Job's sufferings. The apostle John helped to unveil some of that mystery of our Lord's work and ways. On Ash Wednesday, our readings return us to the beginning, Genesis in fact. We read once again about where we have come from and how God first graciously worked on our behalf through quite messed-up families, just like ours. We also will read Mark's Gospel throughout Lent, jumping "immediately" into Jesus' work on our behalf.

The project was financed with a 25 year building loan from Lutheran Church Extension Fund for \$80,000. As of 12/31/17, the principle balance due is \$24,484. Through the generous giving of the congregation, 70% of the original loan has been paid off in two years! We are well on our way toward the goal of paying this loan off in four years. - Read and discuss the daily reading with a family member or friend.
- Choose one verse to commit to memory, reciting it through the day.
- Speak to God in prayer about something from the reading that impressed or confused you in this reading.
- If you miss a day or two (or three) and fall behind, don't worry and don't quit! Either set aside some time to catch up or skip those readings and move on.
- If you're using another reading schedule or guide, stick with it. The important thing is to be in the Word
 daily.
