Pastor's Letter

January, 2019
"The Epiphany of Our Lord"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Have you ever had the 'delightful' experience of listening to someone tell you a long story, and as you listen you find yourself saying to yourself, 'self, I have no idea where this is going'? But you patiently listen to the story, because patience is a virtue, and you desire to be a virtuous person. And every once in a while your patience is rewarded - "Eureka! Now I see where this very long story was headed." (If only it was rewarded more often.)

Sometimes it's like that with God. The Bible is a very long story. And who hasn't attempted to read it, and along the way, wondered, "where is this going?" (The thing with the bible that makes it different than a lot of 'those stories,' is that we absolutely know that it's going somewhere.)

Take for example that pretty long story about two guys named Balak and Balaam. Balak is the king of the Moabites who has got his tail feathers in a tussle over the fact that the Israelites that have come out of Egypt seem to be settling in Moab. (It's an immigration issue. Not that we would know anything about that.)

Balaam seems to be one of those 'spiritual but not religious' guy who claims to have some sort of special connection with God. He's what you'd call 'a wise man.'

Balak needs a 'wise man' to get in touch with some divine intervention. He googles "wise men" and gets "Balaam, son of Beor." Balak wants Balaam to get God to curse the Israelites and make them go away. As hard as he tries, Balaam just can't come up with the right incantation to make it happen. Instead, God puts words into Balaam's mouth that pronounce blessing upon blessing upon Israel. One in particular goes like this, "a star shall come out of Jacob, and a scepter shall rise out of Israel; it shall crush the forehead of Moab and break down all the sons of Sheth." (Numbers 24:17)

Now, here's the interesting part that caught my attention. For some reason, God seems to think it's important that we know where Balaam is from. "Balak sent messengers to Balaam the son of Beor at Pethor, which is near the River in the land of the people of Amaw." (Numbers 22:5). After checking Google maps for Pethor and Amaw and coming up empty, I checked my "The Lutheran Study Bible" only to discover that "the River" is the Euphrates River and Pethor is in Babylonia. Eventually, Babylon will be a place which becomes known for having lots of 'wise men.' (Read the book of Daniel).

By this time, I'm sure you're asking yourself, "self, where's he going with this?" Hold on, here it comes. Centuries later, 'wise men' from the east, see a star in the sky and say to themselves, 'let's chase it.' And when their wise men friends asked them, "why would you do a crazy thing like that," they said, "because this is the star that our old wise man friend Balaam was talking about. It points to the one who is born to be king of kings." (Or something like that.) And off they went with gifts fit for a king.

You just knew this was going somewhere didn't you? Our God always knows where His story is going. And patience is always a virtue.

Notes from your Deaconess

January, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

We've begun again to experience more daylight hours here in Maine. A month ago we started the new church year, and now we turn the calendars in our homes to January. As the new year begins, we remember with sadness and joy things past. But we also make plans and have hopes for events to come. We do well to bring all these things to our heavenly Father in prayer.

The church has always together sung and prayed the Psalms—which include these kinds of memories, along with hopes and requests. The Psalms, as a poetic portion of God's word, teach us who we are and also help us to speak to God. We find psalms of praise, lament, penitence (sorrow for sin), and even asking for God's vengeance. We can sing, read, and pray these words all together as a church body, but also in our homes in groups, or alone. Before Jesus had given his disciple the Lord's Prayer, the Hebrew people, including Jesus, had been using psalms as prayer for centuries.

Our tour of the <u>Lutheran Service Book</u> continues with a set of pages where you will find many of the Psalms. You'll notice that all of these have the *Gloria Patri* – a trinitarian doxology – placed at their conclusion. The included Psalms occur in the various readings for the Sunday service. As this lectionary does not include *all* of the Psalms, and as the editors of our hymnal had limited space, you'll notice skipped Psalms, and also only portions of others. You also will see a page just before the Psalms section (page xxvi) describing how to sing the Psalms with various chant tones.

You might like to read through all the Psalms on your own—you can do so one or more a day in order, except Psalm 119, which may be better read over a few days. Or you might try the schedule noted at the end of the daily lectionary reading section on page 304. That schedule doesn't cover all the Psalms either, but has a majority subset like the LSB.

Once we begin the season of Epiphany on January 6, our daily lectionary readings move from Isaiah and Luke to the prophet Ezekiel who had many vivid strange visions and prophecies given him by the Lord during the exile of Israel. The season of Epiphany relates to how Christ is revealed throughout the world—not just to the people of Israel through whom and by whom he came for us all. Ezekiel's prophecies relate to this topic, and the epistle to the Romans, the New Testament reading for most of the month, also show clearly how he came for all people.

I plan to hold women's Bible studies on Saturdays January 12 and 26 – weather permitting and unless some travel plans arise unexpectedly.

Romans 10:11-13: For the Scripture says, "Everyone who believes in him will not be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; for the same Lord is Lord of all, bestowing his riches on all who call on him. For "everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved." [The quotes in this text come from Psalm 25 and Joel 2.]

A special 'door offering' for Lutheran For Life will be taken this Sunday. The Board for Missions will match the congregation's offerings.


<u>Lutherans For Life Statement of Philosophy:</u>

Some helpful habits for home devotions:

- Do one reading in the morning and the other in the evening.
- Keep a journal or make a mental note of one thought that you would like to remember from this reading.
- Read and discuss the daily reading with a family member or friend.
- Choose one verse to commit to memory, reciting it through the day.
- Speak to God in prayer about something from the reading that impressed or confused you in this reading.
- If you miss a day or two (or three) and fall behind, don't worry and don't quit! Either set aside some time to catch up or skip those readings and move on.
- If you're using another reading schedule or guide, stick with it. The important thing is to be in the Word daily
