Pastor's Letter



Summer, 2017 "Greater love has no one than this, that someone lay down his life for his friends. John 15:13

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A little boy had a dollar to buy a puppy at the local pet store. The \$25 price tag sent him home heartbroken. But he was determined. He raked yards, ran errands, collected aluminum cans. Eventually he had \$25. He returned to the pet store, showed his money to the manager and inspected the puppies. They smiled and wagged their entire bodies. It was a long inspection. Then he pointed to a scrawny brown puppy in the corner and said, "I want that one please." The store manager picked up the dog and said, "Son, you don't want this one. He's crippled, has been lame since birth. He can't run or play or fetch a stick. Pick another one." The boy insisted, "I want that one please." He paid his money and left, puppy squirming under his arm. As he walked out, the manager noticed for the first time, that the boy limped because of the steel brace that ran down his leg and attached to his shoe.

Sometimes you just have to have experienced someone else's problem for yourself in order to be that special friend. How does the hymn say it? "Jesus knows our every weakness." How do the Scriptures say it? "For we do not have a high priest who cannot sympathize with or weaknesses, but was tempted in all point as we were, yet without sin." (Heb.4:15).

Jesus knows our every weakness because He has taken our every weakness onto Himself. He's taken our physical infirmities and they have left Him permanently scared. He has suffered our emotional infirmities and He knows the pain of rejection, betrayal, abandonment, abuse. He has even experienced our spiritual infirmities and He knows the darkness of a life that is separated from the love of God.

Every weakness and infirmity that you and I may have ever dealt with or may be dealing with right now, Jesus knows because He has experienced it Himself. In fact, because He is without sin, those infirmities He bears - are ours!

For this reason Jesus Christ is unlike any other friend that we have ever had. We can come to Him with anything that is troubling us - even if it is a weak and waning faith - and He knows what we mean and He knows how to take it from us and bear it Himself.

I pray that you would be a friend and invite a friend of yours to meet the best friend that anyone can ever have – Jesus Christ.

Notes from your Deaconess

Summer, 2017

Dear brothers and sisters of LCR,

On our journey through the Divine Service we come now to the **Creed**, the **Hymn of the Day**, and **Sermon**. Within the Service of the Word, these three parts follow the readings, although occasionally the Hymn of the Day occurs between the Epistle and Gospel.

The confession of the **Creed** in the Service of Word and Sacrament wasn't used until after 1000AD. Previously, it had only taken place during the baptismal service. (*Check out Pastor Nielsen's sermon from Trinity Sunday* ((6/11/2017)) for more about the creeds we use.) The Creed summarizes the narrative of the entire scriptures, so it goes well just after the readings. Sometimes it comes after the sermon, as the people together affirm that the word as read and then proclaimed. The Creed also describes who is on the altar for us with His body and blood, conceived and born of the virgin Mary...

The **Hymn of the Day** and the **Sermon** interpret and expand on the readings for the day. Most often they focus on the Gospel reading, but also in its relation to the Old Testament and Epistle readings. The practice of such teaching certainly already took place in Jesus' day in the synagogues. After the reading of scripture, a rabbi would teach those assembled the meaning and use of those scriptures, relating it to other passages as well. We see Jesus speaking this way in synagogues in the gospels, as in Luke 4:16-27. St. Paul also followed this pattern throughout the missionary trips he made in the book of Acts. (Look for this in the daily lectionary readings in the coming month.) The Hymn of the Day seems to be one of the more recent additions to the Divine Service from the Lutheran reformers in the sixteenth century.

In our worship services we regularly review a section of Luther's Small Catechism, and have a children's sermon as well within this part of the Service of the Word. The review fits near the Creed even though it doesn't appear in the orders in our service book since it, too, explains important portions of scripture and our faith. The children's sermon also belongs here.

As Pastor Nielsen told us a couple of Sundays ago (June 18), we now have about half of a church year ahead of us without any festivals or feasts--until Advent and Christmas. During this time of quiet growth we will hear Sunday readings from the gospel of Matthew, with Jesus' teaching, parables, healing, and journeys of his ministry. The daily lectionary during July continues to move through the Old Testament book of Joshua as he leads Israel into the Promised Land. The New Testament readings continue with the Acts of the Apostles and the early church spreading through the lands around the Mediterranean.

Right now I'm planning on holding women's Bible studies on the second and fourth Saturday mornings of July and August (7/8 and 7/22, 8/12 and 8/26). Feel free to contact me to confirm that.

As you travel, relax, and enjoy the summertime, I hope that you will "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, teach and admonish one another in all wisdom, and sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs with thankfulness to God." Colossians 3:16

WORSHIP AND HYMNS THAT STAND APART FROM THE FRAY

I once asked a group of young people: "Name me words you hear in church that you do not hear at school." As you can imagine, their list was long. One boy offered the word "alleluia". I asked him what the word meant. He thought for a moment and answered: "Hooray for God!" When you think about it, that was not a bad answer. However, I don't think we are ready to replace "alleluia" in the Divine Service with the expression "Hooray for God!"

The story is told of how Christianity was introduced to Russia. More than 1,000 years ago Grand Duke Vladimir of Kiev desired to find an appropriate religion for his new nation. He sent emissaries to investigate the major religions of the day, including Roman Catholicism and Islam. Upon visiting the Orthodox Church in Constantinople they found what they were looking for. In their report to the duke, the emissaries noted that in Orthodox worship there was such a solemn splendor that they had a hard time knowing whether they were in heaven or on earth. That is the essence of worship: one foot in heaven, the other here on earth.

We hear complaints that the church is out of touch with the modern world and culture. We should not take that as a criticism. Admittedly, the Order of the Divine Service and the Hymns we sing are "not of this world." (see John 18:33) Mark records Jesus inviting His disciples to, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." (Mark 6:31 NIV) Each Lord's Day when you and I enter the church we are responding to Jesus' invitation to come with Him away from the world to a "quiet place" where we also may pause to rest from the frenetic pace of our lives in this world.

A noted church leader wrote: "Aim at pleasing (God) more than yourself, or any other creature. In order to do this attend strictly to the sense of what you sing, and see that your heart is not carried away with the sound, but offered to God continually; so shall your singing be such as the Lord will approve here, and reward you when he cometh in the clouds of heaven."

Read those words carefully. They miss the point of why we worship and sing as we do. Our purpose is not to please God, or to gain His approval, nor to win a reward. In the Introduction to the hymnal Lutheran Worship we read: "The rhythm of our worship is from (God) to us, and then from us back to Him. He gives His gifts, and together we receive and extol them (in music and words)." *(parenthesis mine)*. As the apostle John writes: "We love because *he first loved us*." (1 John 4:9) All that you and I say and sing in the worship begins with God and is a response to what God in Christ has already done for us.

I spoke with a woman who insisted she wanted to hear only the King James translation of the Bible. I agreed it is beautiful English, but added that some people have difficulty understanding it. She answered. "I don't want to understand it. I just want it to sound nice." Unfortunately, that is how some people come to worship. They are not concerned with whether the words sung are true or false but only with whether they sound nice. The liturgies and the hymns chosen for the Lutheran Service Book were not selected based upon a popularity contest but upon the biblical correctness of the words spoken and sung and for the aesthetic beauty and dignity of the music. For this we give thanks and raise a heartfelt "Hooray for God!"

Board for Missions - Meeting Minutes of June 12, 2017

- Review of mission budget. Funds available for Missions at end of May are \$1,633.48.
- Sr. Youth Group 5/16 Mission Trip funding for this project came entirely from dedicated gifts to the Sr. Youth Group from fundraisers and special offerings. Therefore there was no expense from the Missions budget as was planned.
- Lutheran Braille Workers A review and discussion of the work of LBW took place based on a Spring, 2017 newsletter. The expense for producing one bible in braille is \$185. It was voted to recommend sending \$370 to LBW for two bibles.
- Teen Challenge of New England A review and discussion of the work of Teen Challenge took place based on a flyer from the organization. After discussion, Amanda will ask Darryll Zahner for more clarification on this organization's work.
- It was voted to recommend sending \$500 to the Waterville Area Food Bank.
- Amanda indicated that she may need to step off of the Board due to a possible volunteer position with a PTA. If it happens, it will take effect in September, 2017. New Board members will need to be recruited.

The next Board for Missions meeting is scheduled for Monday, August 7th - 6:30pm.

The Board would encourage members of the congregation who would like to participate on the board to speak to any of the members or pastor.
