Pastor's Letter



Summer, 2018 "Survival of the Weakest"

"But he said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me." 2 Corinthians 12:9

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

On November 24, 1859, Charles Darwin published a paper entitled, "The Origin of the Species." In it, Darwin provided his explanation for the observations he had made while sailing among the Galapagos Islands on his boat, "The Beagle." In summary, he concluded that individual species evolved into various forms as the stronger members of that species survived and the weaker members were eliminated. It was a process he called "natural selection" and it was based on the principle of the "survival of the fittest."

"Survival of the fittest" is a logical explanation for why some species seem to survive and prosper while others do not. 'Survival of the fittest' can also apply to survival in a highly competitive world where survival depends on the ability to produce and where there's always someone with greater strength or skill to take our place.

It is truly remarkable to consider just how contrary the ways of God towards man are to the ways of man towards his fellow man. With God, it is not "survival of the fittest" but "survival of the weakest." St. Paul put it like this, "He [Jesus] said to me, 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' Therefore I will boast all the more gladly of my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may rest upon me." (2 Cor.12:9).

Rather than commending the healthy, strong and domineering, Jesus commends the weakest and most vulnerable and actually uses weakness as strength. Jesus does not single out the mighty, strong and the 'fittest' for His kingdom. Rather, He announces to the lowest and the least the good news that He is come to bless them. "Blessed are the poor in spirit;" "Blessed are the meek;" "Blessed are the merciful."

As Paul's commentary on Jesus' Beatitudes, he writes, "God chose what is weak in the world to shame the strong." (1 Corinthians 1:27). Maybe this helps us understand why St. Paul goes on to say, "For the sake of Christ, then, I am content with weaknesses...For when I am weak, then I am strong." (2 Cor.12:10).

Incredibly, it is through weakness that God has accomplished His greatest work. The power of God is carried out in the weakness of the cross. So utterly contrary to the Darwinian instincts in us, God humbled Himself and became obedient unto death even death on a cross. It is in this weakness unto death, that God has "highly exalted" His only-begotten Son.

What does this all mean for us? It should mean that we are not to pursue our survival by being stronger and fitter than our competitors and rivals. Rather, we are free to be the weak and lowly servant, trusting that our Lord has already assured our survival by His weakness. As human beings who have been recreated in the image of Christ, we are fittest when we are weak, for in our weakness, we are imitating Jesus and able to love our neighbor as He has loved us.

Notes from your Deaconess

Summer, 2018

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Some endings and conclusions bring sadness, confusion, and uncertainties, but our Sunday worship ends with peace, and anticipation for how God will lead us in the coming days. At the conclusion of our weekly services together, we depart from one another after hearing a **Benediction** from the Pastor. These words of blessing which occur at the end of all five settings of the Divine Service come from Numbers 6:24-26. The Lord gave these words to Moses for Aaron and his sons (the priests of Israel) to speak to the people. God told Moses that by these words they would *put His name on the people*. Martin Luther added this final piece of the service. The Catholic service before had not included it. This blessing is not a prayer, but performative language—as God's word does what it says. The Pastor faces us and speaks (or sings) to us with the Lord's words. So he sends us from the place where we have heard from, been forgiven by, met with, fed by, and tasted our Lord, with the Lord's name on us, His face shining on us, and with His peace. Thus we bring Christ to the world in our families, workplaces, schools, stores, and wherever we find ourselves.

Right now I plan to lead a Saturday morning Bible study on July 14, (8:30-10am at church) but am uncertain of other dates yet. There may be occasional other kinds of gatherings to discuss books and the like, so keep in touch! Email, phone, or check with me at church to find out any new plans. Remember to check out www.womenoflcr.wordpress.com and feel free to join the book discussion there at any time. (Women only, if you please.) Consider coming to the summertime "Evening with the Family" on Fourth Fridays, July 27 and August 24. We have some informal time for a story, games, crafts, fellowship and then some singing together.

Our daily lectionary readings from the Old Testament during July and August bring us through the many years of the people of Israel beginning with the fall of Jericho under the leadership of Joshua, through the period of the Judges of Israel (concluding with Samuel), and the first kings of Israel — namely Saul, David and Solomon. This covered some four or five hundred years. In the New Testament, we'll read from the book of the Acts of the Apostles, and epistles (letters) written by Paul to the Galatians and the Corinthians. The early church wrestled with many of the same issues that the Israelite people did in the Old Testament, and that we do today. Every time we read these passages we see anew how God worked and works through his people.

"Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself...Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us." (2 Corinthians 5:17-20)

REPORT ON THE NEW ENGLAND DISTRICT CONVENTION

The Convention was held in Springfield, Massachusetts beginning at 7:45 p.m. on Thursday evening, June 14th, with an Opening Communion Worship Service at St. John's Lutheran Church, Westfield, Massachusetts and ending with lunch at the Convention site on Saturday afternoon, June 16th.

Here is a list of the more important actions taken during the Convention.

- 1. The re-election of Rev. Timothy Yeadon as President of the NED (Rev. Yeadon has now served as NED President since 2012).
- 2. The election of the three Vice Presidents:

 - b. 2nd VP, from Region 2 Rev. Scott Schuett, Redeemer Lutheran Church, Lebanon, Connecticut
 - c. 3rd VP, from a Region 1 Rev. Jim Butler, St. Luke's, Dedham, Massachusetts
- 3. The re-election of the NED Secretary Rev. Walt Harper, Immanuel Lutheran Church, Danbury, Connecticut
- 4. The election of the NED Treasurer Mr. Samuel Eddinger, Grace Lutheran Church, Middletown, Connecticut

- 5. Election of the Board of Directors:
 - a. Ordained Ministers of Religion
 - (1) Rev. Randall Pekari, Our Savior, South Windsor, Connecticut
 - (2) Rev. Timothy Sandeno, Redeemer, Gorham, Maine
 - b. Commissioned Minister of Religion <u>Deaconess Sharon Conover</u>, Lutheran Church of the Resurrection, Waterville, Maine
 - c. Lay Members

- a. 18-01-01. A minimum recommendation for specific time off for full-time workers within the NED, to wit, 11 days annually for holidays, 2 days per week, 10 days annually including 2 Sunday's for vacation, and a 12 week sabbatical for pastors.

Passed - 88.5%

b. 18-01-02. The Deaconess for Human Care should be renamed the Director of Worker Support; and that the Church Worker Support Team (already in existence) shall support and promote the ministries of said Director under the auspices of the Parish Life Department. And also that District Bylaw 6.12 shall be amended to add certain special needs ministries to the Missions Department.

Passed - 88.6%

c. 18-01-03b. The Compensation Decision Support Tools, which include cost of living differences within different communities, shall replace the NED salary guidelines, and that these tools shall be recommended for Synod wide use at the 2019 Convention.

Passed - by voice vote

d. 18-01-04. Continued non-fellowship specifically with ELCA churches.

Rejected - 85.1%

e. 18-01-05. Congregations shall continue to confess biblical doctrine regarding human sexuality and gender as expressed by official LCMS statements. Congregations shall respond with truth and love to persons struggling with gender identity issues.

Passed - 71.4%

f. 18-01-06. Designation of Convention opening worship offering to NED Church Planting Program (\$709.28). Passed - 95.5%
