"What Does It Mean To Confess Jesus Christ as my Lord"?

Small Catechism Explanation – Question #5

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"What does it mean to confess Jesus Christ as my Lord?" Great question! But once again, it's a mouthful and a mindful. Let's break it down into some smaller bites to chew on.

What does it mean to 'confess' Jesus Christ as my Lord?

I always swallow deeply when I read this word in the original language of the New Testament where the word translated, 'confess' is 'martyr.' A 'martyr' is someone who is killed because of their religious or other beliefs. That the New Testament Church would choose THAT word to communicate what it has in mind when the call goes out to "confess Jesus Christ as my Lord" is both powerful and intimidating.

Throughout history, people are killed to silence them. Governments like Rome put people to death in torturous ways for refusing to 'confess' that Caesar is Lord. What the Church is saying however is that rather than silencing the confession of Jesus Christ as Lord by ending their life, their "martyrdom" becomes the bold 'confession' that the world sees and hears and that proclaims their faith even more loudly than their words could ever do.

What does it mean to confess Jesus Christ as "my Lord."

A lord is someone who has authority over others simply because he is their 'lord' and they are his 'servants.' He makes demands and expects them to be followed. A lord is also the one who takes responsibility for providing for his own subjects.

To 'confess' that Jesus Christ is 'my Lord' is to say that He is the one to whom we belong as servants to a master. We are to serve Him according to His Word. He is also the One on whom we depend to provide for all that we need for this body and life.

To 'confess' that Jesus Christ is Lord is one thing. To 'confess' that Jesus Christ is 'my Lord' is another thing altogether. By including that little word 'my,' we are saying that we are one who belongs to Jesus Christ as a servant belongs to his Lord and that we trust that He will provide for all that we need for this body and life, even eternal life.

Now we're ready to put the pieces together again. "What does it mean to confess that Jesus Christ is my Lord?" Even today, we are surrounded by many forces that would silence our 'confession' that Jesus Christ is my Lord, and I'm not thinking about governments. Just think of the many ways that the activities and programs and luxuries that we enjoy and the demands that they make on us effectively silence our 'confession that Jesus Christ is my Lord.' In this nation, we are blessed that we are not faced with forces that seek to silence or confession by 'tortuous' means. It is rather by 'pleasurable' means that we are pressured into 'martyrdom.' What are those things that we must strive to say 'no' to in order to "confess that Jesus Christ is my Lord"? It may just involve "martyrdom," which is the loudest 'confession' we can make.

Notes from your Deaconess

Summer, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Daily routines give us stability and comfort. The first cup of tea, coffee, or water may be a morning pleasure. Walking a dog, or feeding the dog or cat may be something you look forward to everyday. Maybe even the opening and closing of shades or curtains in your home helps with the shape of the day. The more often we spend chunks of time in prayer, reading scripture, and turning our thoughts away from ourselves and towards our creator, redeemer, and comforter, the more naturally will his Word weave into our thoughts and our encounters with every person we meet and every situation which arises. The next pages of our <u>Lutheran Service Book</u>, 294 through 298, include brief orders of worship entitled "Daily Prayer: For Individuals and Families". They all have similar orders, but with variations for the time of day. You'll see *Morning*, *Noon*, *Early Evening*, and *Close of Day* as their titles. These nicely fall near mealtimes and bedtime—or the morning one could be used when first getting up from sleep. Even to attempt to use one of them regularly can provide a bit of shape to your day.

The first page (294) gives suggestions for how you might use the services, and for some particular areas to pray about each day. Each order has some set things—vesicles, creeds, prayers—to read or say, and some parts which provide opportunity for variety from day to day. The place in each service for "An appointed reading" could include one of those listed for the time of day, a "Portals of Prayer" devotion, or else one or both of the "Daily Lectionary" readings. Those daily scriptures, which I highlight each month, and which Pastor includes in these newsletters, are found just after these pages (LSB pages 299 – 304). At a loss for the right words to say in the prayer times? Check out the many "Prayers, Intercessions, and Thanksgivings" in the section on pages 305 to 318. You also might check the back of your "Portals of Prayer" booklet, as it, too, contains a number of prayers to use in different situations, and for particular celebrations and holidays. (We actually have laminated pamphlets of the orders for "Daily Prayer" at church. Just ask me or Pastor for one or more copies.)

Our daily lectionary readings from the Old Testament during July and August bring us through the many years of the people of Israel beginning with the fall of Jericho under the leadership of Joshua, through the period of the Judges of Israel (concluding with Samuel), and the first kings of Israel—namely Saul, David and Solomon. This covered some four or five hundred years. In the New Testament, we'll read from the book of the Acts of the Apostles, and epistles written by Paul to the Galatians and the Corinthians. The early churches wrestled with many of the same issues that the Israelite people did in the Old Testament, and that we do today. Every time we read these passages we see anew how God worked and works through his people.

Saturday morning women's Bible studies continue through the summer, twice in July (6, 20), and thrice in August (3, 17, 31). We'll work through and study St. Paul's epistle to the Philippians — a brief and dense but joyful letter. Whether you can come once in a while or more often, you are always welcome! I hope you'll join us for some fellowship, study, and sharing of prayer concerns. We meet from about 8:30am until 10am.


