Pastor's Letter

June, 2019

"What Is the Christian Faith?" "What is a Christian?"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"What is the Christian faith?" So begins the 'Explanation of the Small Catechism'. I suspect that if you were to ask your friends or family members or neighbors that question, you'd get some pretty interesting answers, such as... "The Christian faith is a way of living that helps you be a better person." "The Christian faith is one way among many to worship God." "The Christian faith tells you what you have to do to get to heaven when you die."

So, what about you? How do you answer the question, "what is the Christian faith?"

Actually, there are two ways to correctly answer this question depending on how you hear it. First, there's the answer that puts all of the focus on Christ and who He is and what He has done. "The Christian faith is the confession that Jesus Christ is the world's only Savior and Redeemer."

This begs the question, "Who is Jesus Christ?" (Question #2) "Jesus is true God and true man in one person. He is the eternal Son of the Father, conceived by the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary to be our Savior and Lord. This God who became flesh in the person of the Son, Jesus Christ is the only true God, the Holy Trinity: Father, Son and Holy Spirit."

That may sound like both a mouthful and a headful, but every part of that answer is critical to getting it right. Misunderstanding or misrepresenting any of these parts and pieces results in something other than who Christ really is and what the "Christian faith" really is. And the fact that this happens is a lot is why we get all those bad answers from our family, friends and neighbors.

The second way to answer this question, "What is the Christian faith," just as correctly is to put the emphasis on the Christian. Question #4, "What is a Christian?" I also suspect that our family, friends and neighbors would have some pretty interesting answers to that question as well, such as... "A Christian is someone who prays." "A Christian is someone who goes to church on Sunday." "A Christian is someone who tries to do good."

So, what about you? How do you answer the question, "What is a Christian?"

"A Christian is someone who, by the power and work of the Holy Spirit through the Word of God, believes in and confesses Jesus as Savior and Lord. Through Baptism, a Christian is adopted into the Father's family, the Church."

Again, a mouthful and headful, but also again, each and every part of the answer is critical to getting it right. We are living in a world that is very confused about what the Christian faith is and what it means to be a Christian. This confusion has led to so many tragic results. How very important it is for us to have a clear understanding and confession, both for ourselves as well as for our confused family, friends and neighbors! So, along with your Bible, read your Small Catechism regularly.

Notes from your Deaconess June, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Have you, as I certainly have, ever found yourself recounting the most annoying actions or comments of someone to another friend or acquaintance? Or perhaps, like me, you've reacted angrily or hastily towards someone and wished you could have a second chance to make a more measured and reasoned response? Every Sunday in the Divine Service, I gratefully have the opportunity to confess those sins and hear the absolution which our Pastor speaks "in the stead and by the command" of our Lord Jesus Christ.

The next two brief sections which we find in our Lutheran Service Book (pages 290 through 293) are liturgies of confession and absolution. The first is a lengthy form of Corporate Confession and Absolution, which we generally use during our Maundy Thursday services each year, but I have experienced (at the seminary) as a stand-alone service the evening before a service which will include the Lord's Supper. The second one is an Individual Confession and Absolution liturgy. Pastor Nielsen has written in the past about how one may meet with him for this, and includes a note every week in the bulletin to remind us. Sometimes actions done by or to us—in thought, word, and deed—particularly may weigh on our minds and lives, and the opportunity to speak aloud these sins in private, and receive the *individual* word of absolution brings comfort which we do not find when part of the whole congregation. I encourage you to take advantage of this precious gift.

This coming month the daily lectionary readings bring us to the end of the gospel of Luke on Holy Trinity Sunday (June 16), at which time we will also finish our time of reading from the books of Moses. At that point we'll move into "The Time of the Church" and go to the readings for specific days of the year until next Ash Wednesday. We will read through the last third of John's gospel starting on June 17, and then begin to read the book of Acts. The Old Testament readings come from the book of Proverbs while we read from John. As we read about the church beginning to move *out* of Jerusalem into the world in Acts, we will follow Joshua as he brings the people of Israel *into* the Promised Land.

Saturday morning women's Bible studies continue through the summer, usually twice each month—this month on June 15 and 29. We'll begin to read through and study the epistle to the Philippians—Paul's brief and dense but joyful letter. I hope you'll join us for some fellowship, study, and sharing of prayer concerns. We meet from about 8:30am until 10am. (True confession—we often run over a bit, but try to honor that time especially for any who need to get to other activities and errands.)

If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. If we say we have not sinned, we make him a liar, and his word is not in us. 1 John 1:8-10
