Pastor's Letter

February, 2017

"The Seven Penitential Psalms"

Mid-Week Lenten Theme

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The theme for our mid-week Lenten services this year is "The Seven Penitential Psalms." In addition to the information that you have received in the mail about the Lenten series, I'd like to add the following:

The word "penitential" is not one that we use very often and may not be all that familiar. "Penitential" is an adjective that describes the person who feels remorse and sorrow when they realize that they are wrong or have done something that is wrong. The opposite of 'penitential' is actually 'unpenitential' and describes someone who has no feelings of remorse or sorry when they realize that they are wrong. '

The word "penitential" is closely connected to the word "repent." It's actually the word that Martin Luther used in the 1st of the 95 Thesis – "Our Lord and Master Jesus Christ, when He said repent (*literally*, 'be penitential'), willed that the whole life of believers should be repentance." That is, the believer before God is always in a 'penitential' state of heart and mind because he knows that he is sinner and he is sorry and remorseful. He is disappointed and ashamed of himself, not in fear of God, but like a child is ashamed and sorry for having disappointed his loving father.

The 'Seven Penitential Psalms' express the sorry and contrite spirit of the believer before God in powerful and poignant ways. The 'penitential psalms' are different than the 'lament psalms.' The 'lament psalms' express the lamentation of the believer who is suffering for whatever reason and who cries out to God for Him to see their plight and come to their aid and relieve them of their suffering. The 'penitential psalms' however are much more interested in the root cause for our suffering – our own sin.

The grouping together of these seven psalms into a unique collection happened early in the life of the church. Historically, the church has divided the day into eight time periods and a particular order for prayer was assigned to each period of the day. "Matins" was the first time period of the day. "Lauds" was the second, which began at daybreak or 3:00am. The 'seven penitential psalms' were assigned to be prayed on Fridays at "Lauds" during the season of Lent, which was one of the first additions to the church year calendar.

Even though Luther broke with the penitential system of the medieval church, he retained the use of these psalms as the biblical expression of the only proper position of man before God. The sinner's only true hope before the holy God is that God will be gracious and merciful to the sinner and forgive his sins, not because of any merit or worthiness in him, but solely for the sake of Christ.

Only the truly 'penitent' sinner who is deeply sorry for his sin and hates himself, longs for a truly gracious God and seeks Him who loves Him perfectly in Christ. The sinner who is not truly 'penitent' and who does not thoroughly hate himself before God doesn't hunger and thirst for righteousness and therefore feels no compelling need for God's mercy and forgiveness. He only wants God's approval and thanks.

I pray that our mid-week Lenten series this year helps us to see ourselves as we truly are before God, so that we may see the mercy and love of God for us in Christ that He truly has for us.

Notes from your Deaconess March, 2017

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

As we begin the season of Lent and take a look at the next section of the Divine Service, we find the **Hymn of Praise**—which we won't even be singing this month! This *ordinary* part of the entrance rite—we still have a couple more elements of entrance before the actual liturgy or service of the Word itself—does change a bit with the season of the church year, but normally comes at this point. During the seasons of Advent and Lent, which traditionally have been times of preparation for great feasts of the year, we completely leave out the Hymn of Praise.

We sing settings of two particular hymns of praise through most of our church year. The *Gloria in Excelsis* ("Glory to God in the highest") occupies this place in the service for the majority of the year. A form of this hymn likely has been sung since the fourth century in church services—that's around 1700 years! Its words first include those which the angels sang for the shepherds after Jesus' birth in Bethlehem (Luke 2:14) and then also speak of Jesus' identity as the Lamb of God, along the lines of John the Baptist's proclamation to his hearers in John 1:29. This recalls for us Jesus' incarnation, his presence for us in Word and Sacrament, and as the particular place where heaven and earth now meet together in peace.

During the Easter season, from Easter Sunday through Pentecost, and then for All Saints and the last Sunday of the church year, we sing settings of "This is the feast" or "Worthy is Christ". This is a translation of "Dignus est Agnus", a Latin text which doesn't have as deep a church history, but may first have been Gregorian chant, and contains parts of the hymns of praise from chapters 4, 5, 11 and 15 of the book of Revelation which John wrote for our benefit. We focus on the victory Jesus has won for us through his death and resurrection, and again draws our attention to the oneness we have with the church triumphant—that includes all who have preceded us in this faith.

We look forward to singing that hymn on Easter, but we now need to journey through Lent, a time of preparation for the great feast, by examining ourselves. We look at our sinfulness, our broken condition, and acknowledge the suffering which we "justly deserve" for that sin, but also look to Jesus as he "set his face to go to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51) to his death for us. The daily lectionary readings return us to the beginning, Genesis in fact. Once again we read about where we have come from and the way God first graciously worked on our behalf through quite messed-up families, just like ours. We also will read Mark's Gospel throughout Lent, jumping "immediately" into Jesus' work on our behalf.

I will be continuing to hold Saturday morning Bible studies for women on the second (3/11) and fourth (3/25) Saturdays of this month, and hope that you might consider joining in. We meet at 8:30 or so in a downstairs classroom and finish by 10am.

Blessings in this Lenten season to you all.


