Pastor's Letter

March, 2018 "Private Confession and Absolution"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"*Private Confession and Absolution.*" I know. It sounds too "Catholic" to be "Lutheran," right? Wrong! "Private Confession and Absolution" belongs to the whole Church as a precious gift for all Christians.

So, what's it all about?

First, the practice of confession and absolution is central to the teachings of the Scriptures. We do just this every Sunday at the very beginning of the Divine Service. We confess, **"I, a poor miserable sinner, confess unto You all my sins and iniquities with which I have ever offended You..."** And then we receive the absolution. "Upon this your confession, I as a called and ordained servant of the Word, announce the grace of God to all of you, and in the stead and by the command of my Lord Jesus Christ, I forgive you all of your sins, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

In CORPORATE Confession and Absolution, no specific, personal sins are mentioned. It's all very general and deals with who we are 'by nature' before God – 'sinful and unclean,' 'imploring His mercy.'

PRIVATE Confession and Absolution is the same Confession and Absolution except that it gives the penitent the opportunity to address particulars sin he/she has been carrying and hand them over to Jesus Who has already atoned for it by His blood. In return, the Absolution is just as personal. "I forgive you <u>(name)</u>, in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit."

<u>The Confession is</u> the acknowledgement of the sin, vocally, and in the presence of another person, usually the pastor. There's no opportunity for explanation or excuse or rationalization. Likewise, there's no scolding or preaching from the pastor. Neither is there any judgment about whether or not the penitent is 'truly contrite' or whether the confession is 'sincere.' Confession is just that – 'out loud confession.' And the goal of Confession is 'out loud absolution.'

<u>The Absolution is</u> nothing other than the Gospel being applied directly to you. It's not 'advice' or 'counseling.' It's God's act of forgiving you here and now. Absolution does not simply promise forgiveness, nor does it give assurance or reassurance of God's forgiveness. It actually grants and bestows forgiveness, here and now, TO YOU for THIS SIN!

It is God Himself who forgives all sins. But He carries out this power through the Gospel spoken, proclaimed. And when His Word is proclaimed, He Himself is present in that proclamation. It is His voice. The Augsburg Confession puts it like this, "It *(absolution)* is not the voice or word of the man who speaks it, but it is the Word of God, who forgives sins, for it is spoken in God's stead and by God's command." *(Augsburg Confession XXXV:3)* It should also be said that everything that is said in Confession falls under the strict seal of confidentiality.

The benefits of Confession and Absolution for the penitent are too numerous to list here. But it most certainly includes the assurance of God's love and forgiveness, consolation, relief from anxiety and/or guilt, peace for a troubled heart. The grateful heart now wants to amend his sinful life and do better and gathers strength from God's grace to do so.

I invite you to take advantage of this precious gift that God has given to His Christians. Luther once wrote, "Therefore, when I urge you to go to confession, I am simply urging you to be a Christian." (*Large Catechism*) Private confession and absolution is scheduled with me by appointment.

Notes from your Deaconess March, 2018

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

March may come in like a lion and go out like a lamb, as the saying goes, but this year it will certainly go out like both a lamb AND a lion as we observe Good Friday and Holy Saturday just as the month comes to an end. Jesus goes to the cross as the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world, and as the Lion of Judah he descends into hell, defeating death and opening the gates of life for all who have died in the faith.

In the Divine Service of the Sacrament, just after we hear the Words of Institution, the brief but important exchange of the **Peace of the Lord** (*Pax Domini* in Latin) always occurs before the Distribution. Our Pastor tells (or sings to) us "The peace of the Lord be with you always," and we reply "Amen"--or (from Hebrew) "Yes, indeed this is true and certain." Jesus told his disciples on that night when he was betrayed "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you. Not as the world gives do I give to you" (John 14:27). Nearly every epistle from Paul of the New Testament includes in its opening greetings "Grace to you and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ". Through His gifts of body and blood, the bread and wine which we share, we have peace with our Lord and with each other as he dwells in us. The announcement of peace on earth came to the shepherds on the night of Jesus' birth, and was completed with his death for us on the cross. Certainly not the kind of peace that the world gives.

During the first half of March with our lectionary readings we will complete the second half of Genesis, spending most of those days with Jacob and his very complicated and strife-filled family. How merciful of God to work through such individuals — and through us as well! Then we will begin to read Exodus, the calling of Moses as chosen servant for leading Israel out of Egypt, and reading about the first Passover during Holy Week. We will finish reading the gospel of Mark just before Holy Week, and during the last few days of the month begin the letter to the Hebrews in the New Testament. This epistle of uncertain authorship shows how Jesus is our high priest before the Lord God, offering himself as the final and complete sacrificial lamb for our sin.

I will once again plan to hold women's Bible studies on two Saturdays of the month – March 10 and 24. As I noted last month, these are informal times of fellowship, reading scripture together and seeing what God is saying to us through the word. Questions and suggestions for study are certainly welcome. We have mainly read accounts of many different women in the Bible, and still have not exhausted the possible individuals who could be considered. Hope to have you join me!

"For we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin. Let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (Hebrews 4:15-16)

It has long been the church's custom to conclude Holy Week with a period of three, holy days (*Triduum*), culminating in the Great Feast of Easter. We have a long tradition here, of observing two of those three holy days – "Maundy Thursday" and "Good Friday." The "Vigil of Easter" concludes Holy Week with a special focus on the expectation of Christ's victory over death and the grave by His resurrection on Easter. The order of worship for the Easter Vigil is unlike any other in the church's year and involves an outdoor fire, darkness, candlelight procession from outdoors to the sanctuary, readings and Holy Baptism. The service climaxes with the shout of the long awaited news – "*Christ is risen! He is risen indeed, Alleluia!*" I would be willing to conduct this service if there were at least 10 people committed to attend. The service would begin at **8:30pm. on Saturday, March 31**st. BOARD FOR MISSIONS MEETING MINUTES - February 18, 2018

Attendees: Steve Farr, Bec Keefe, Mike Hein, Yvonne Batson, Nathaniel Batson, Kari Farr, Avis Grant, Michelle Hein, Pastor Nielsen, Deb Nielsen, Andrea Watson, Brian Watson, Sharon Conover.

Michelle called the meeting to order after our worship service and Pastor Nielsen led us in an opening prayer.

Michelle reviewed the current monthly giving which included our Seminary student (\$250), Hope Lutheran Church (\$200) and the LCMS District (5% of offerings).

A discussion regarding the balance of \$2,041.29 carried over from last year took place and it was decided to split this balance evenly between the Elle Louis Konetzki Memorial fund and the Deaconess Carla Strehlow Endowment. It was also decided not to fund the tuition program at Ft. Wayne as it appears they have met their goals for the year. It was also noted this request did not have to go before the Church Council as it was approved at the Congregational Meeting held in December.

A conversation took place about potential contingency plans should we not meet offerings budgeted in the 2018 budget passed at the congregational meeting. Pastor Nielsen reminded the group that our primary mission is to, "Open Hearts through Christ Crucified." We therefore need to maintain our congregational presence and all that is required to support it. Should there be excess, we would be able to fulfill our desire to provide support for other works through the Board for Missions. If we were to run into a shortfall in offerings, this discretionary giving could be reduced with a clear conscious. This will be managed by the Church Council in close communication with the Board for Missions.

Pastor Nielsen reported that missionary Rev. Steven Schumacher will come to Waterville as our mission guest for Missions Sunday. He and his wife are doing mission work in Africa and will be available May 5th and 6th to visit with us. Our BFM proposes to fund their travel expenses and present them with a gift of support for their mission work. Deb, Yvonne and Avis generously volunteered to organize the Mission Sunday events outside Church service that weekend.

We reviewed several websites for new giving suggestions Michelle had sent out with the agenda. These included Veterans of the Cross and a resource called LCMS Recognized Service Organizations. All in attendance were encouraged to look into these opportunities in preparation of further discussion. Michelle proposed to the group we hold on additional funding outside of Mission Sunday and current commitments for now.

There was an excellent discussion about a giving challenge where we could involve the children of our congregation. It involves the Lutheran World Relief Fund and would be around a several week campaign to raise funds to purchase items that vary from clean water to livestock. There could be a presentation at fellowship to kick this off prior to Mission Sunday. Michelle and Sharon will coordinate this effort.

We viewed a brief video produced by Lutheran Hour Ministries that highlighted the collaborative efforts between them and the Garuna Foundation. It was an excellent story.

There was a brief discussion about the meals we provide for the Mid Maine Homeless Shelter and additional ways we can help. This included Thrivent Action Team Dollars and other options. This conversation was tabled for a later meeting.

- If you miss a day or two (or three) and fall behind, don't worry and don't quit! Either set aside some time to catch up or skip those readings and move on.
- If you're using another reading schedule or guide, stick with it. The important thing is to be in the Word daily.
