Pastor's Letter

May, 2016 "Take up your cross and follow me."

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"Then Jesus called the crowd to him along with his disciples and said, 'If anyone would come after me, he must deny himself and take up his cross and follow me. For whoever wants to save his life will lose it, but whoever loses his life for me and for the gospel will save it." (Mark 8:34-35)

A conversation that I overheard going on in my head went something like this:

"Well, here I am, Lord. You said, 'Take up your cross," and I'm here to do it. It's not easy, you know, this self-denial thing. I mean to go through with it, though.. yes sir! I'll bet You wish more people who were willing to be disciples like me. I've counted the cost and surrendered my life, and it's not an easy road, but I'm Your man.

"Do you mind if I look over the crosses that are available? I'd kind of like a new one. I'm not fussy, You understand, but disciples have to be relevant these days. I was wondering, are there any that don't actually look like a cross? I want to attract others to do the same as I'm doing, you see. And if I could show them a comfortable cross, I'm sure I could win a lot more to Your cause.

Oh, and it needs to be something that I can handle. You did say You wouldn't put anything on us that's more than we could handle didn't You?

"Lord, this may sound funny but there doesn't seem to be too much choice here. Just these coarse, rough, wooden things. A person could get splinters. Perhaps if a bit more polished and with a little more style more people would be willing to carry them. I'm sure that some marketing professionals could help with this. I'll bet they could even come up with a program and a snappy slogan that would help attract more people to 'take up' one of these things and follow You.

"What's that Lord? You say that you didn't mean that I get to pick which cross I want to carry, that You have already chosen it for me and this is not about my choice or decision, that I just need to carry it. But Lord, like I said, I want to follow you. The most important thing in my life is to follow you. But you don't understand, I have a right to choose what is best for me. Isn't that why You gave us a free will? Please don't misunderstand; I do plan to follow You. I just want to be sure that I can make a difference in someone's life and help this movement to be successful.

"Now let's see, - which cross shall I choose. No blood, okay? I can't stand the thought of blood, especially my own. There's lots of ways that I can lay down my life for You without actually dying.

"Lord? Jesus? Now where do you suppose He went to?"

Maybe you've overheard a similar conversation in your own head. I suspect that Jesus had a similar conversation in His head as He faced His cross since "we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but one who in every respect has been tempted as we are, yet without sin."

"Yet without sin," means that He did not give into the temptation to take the easy way out. He took up the cross that His Father choose for Him from before the creation of the world.

Let His word as He is being nailed to His cross be the voice that you hear in your head, "Father, forgive them..." And "let us then with confidence draw near to the throne of grace, that we may receive mercy and find grace to help in time of need." (Hebrews 4:15-16)

Seeking to Serve...notes from a Deaconess student

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

In just about three months I will complete these deaconess studies which I began in the fall of 2014. I am hopeful that the church might consider calling me to serve in our parish. I have come to a much fuller and richer understanding and deep appreciation for our Lutheran liturgy, confessions in The Book of Concord, the sacraments, and had the privilege of delving deeply into parts of the Bible. My classmates and I have shared research and resources regarding many Mercy topics—struggles we and those we meet face in our fallen lives and society. Some of these areas include marital issues, infertility, addictions, bereavement, loneliness, and depression. During this past winter's intensive classes I took a course called "Diakonal Counseling". ("Diakonal" is spelled with the "k" instead of "c" to more closely relate to the Greek word diakonia, meaning service.) We together explored some of the ways that we can "Bear one another's burdens, and so fulfill the law of Christ" (Galatians 6:2).

While I have not had training as a professional counselor, I want to make you aware that I would be glad to spend time with any woman who would like to have a listening Christian sister who might help direct or encourage her with God's word and prayer. As Lutheran Christians, we have a different view of persons (anthropology) than many therapeutic counselors, since we believe that human nature is inherently sinful and that all persons need new life in Christ. We see ourselves as forgiven sinners who continue to struggle against sin—simultaneously sinner and saint. I would want to direct someone with serious issues to professional counselors for assistance, but I would hope to keep close connections in terms of care, progress and support through such times. Please feel free to contact me in person, by phone or email.

"Put on then...compassionate hearts, kindness, humility, meekness, and patience, bearing with one another and, if one has a complaint against another, forgiving each other; as the Lord has forgiven you" (Colossians 3:12 – 13).
