Pastor's Letter May, 2017 "Justification by Grace for the Busy Person"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

As we prepare for the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation in October, we give thanks to God for Martin Luther and many others who worked so hard to remind us of what had been forgotten – the Christian faith is based on salvation by grace alone through faith alone for Christ's sake alone.

This is not to say that the church in Luther's day was lifeless or inactive. In fact, the medieval church was incredibly active. Daily worship services were the norm and many people attended worship many times during the course of the week and certainly on Sunday. The vast majority of people were deeply religious and desirous of God's mercy and grace. Despite all of the religious activity and awareness of the day, the vital truth of how sinful men and women are justified before God got lost.

There is a warning in this for our own time. There is a powerful message being circulated these days that it is our activity and busyness that justifies us. For example, there was a time when, if someone asked, 'how are you doing,' we would have replied with 'fine' or 'okay.' Even if we aren't, we still reply this way because we don't want anyone to think we're not 'fine' or 'okay.' Talk about pressure!

But when asked the same question today, we're much more likely to respond with, 'busy.' 'Busy' has become the new measure of 'worth' and 'value.'

The more hectic and frantic things are, the more worthy and valuable you must be, right? The poor soul who is not overworked or and who is never stressed out having more to do than there's time for must not be pulling his weight and doing enough. Talk about pressure!

The problem of course is, there is no such thing as <u>enough</u>. We could always do more and better. But the very fact that we are driven by such demands of <u>the law</u> means that we must believe that this is the way that we <u>justify ourselves</u>. Of course, this is not the 'Law of God.' These are man-made laws that are imposed on us by 'the world' and we buy into them wholeheartedly, even as we complain about the <u>law's demands</u>. But they hold us captive nonetheless – maybe even more so than the 'Law of God.'

So the need for the Reformation may well be is as urgent today as it was in 1517. We need to be reminded again of the good news that gets lost in all the activity to justify ourselves. You are justified by GRACE alone – not because of your worthiness but because God loves you in spite of the fact that you are not worthy. You are justified through FAITH alone – not by your busyness and hectic life. You are justified for CHRIST'S sake alone – all because of what He has done for you.

In his Heidelberg Disputation of 1518, Luther captured the Christian gospel in this remarkable thesis: "The law says 'do this,' and it is never done. Grace says, 'believe this,' and it is already done." (Thesis 26). All of the pressure to justify ourselves has been lifted off of us and put onto Christ. Christ has set us free from the demands of the law. Free to do less or free to do more – but neither as the measure of our worthiness or value. Now we're free to do all that we do in joyful thanks to God and with sincere love for others. Talk about freedom!

Notes from your Deaconess May, 2017

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

During the last several months we've looked at pieces of the Divine Service which take place during the entrance rite, before the **Service of the Word** itself. Recall that the form of our service corresponds to how Jesus frequently interacted with his disciples during his incarnate life in this world: **Word** and **Sacrament**, teaching followed by meal. Look for how frequently he teaches around mealtimes in the lectionary readings from the gospel of Luke this coming month.

We hear from our God, creator and redeemer, and then we see, touch, taste, and take him into ourselves through the sacrament (that Word become flesh and blood for us). We can recognize this pattern in the scope of scriptures — the Word of God creating in the beginning, coming to human ears through the mouths of God's people, and finally becoming a human in Jesus Christ, the second Adam who lived and died and rose again. The Last Supper, which we recall every week, but upon which we also focused just a couple of weeks ago, initiated this meal for our forgiveness and strengthening. Jesus' teaching journey and meal with two disciples on the road to, and at table in Emmaus on the day of resurrection especially shows this order. (If you missed Pastor Nielsen's sermon on April 30, read or listen to it for more on this!)

The Word needs to precede Sacrament, for faith comes through hearing the word. That word comes to us from outside of us and acts on us. In the early churches, all were welcome through the service of the word, and then there was a transition in the service when all who had not yet been baptized, were still receiving instruction, along with visitors, were asked to leave. The Service of the Word includes readings from the Old Testament (usually), an Epistle, and the Gospel, with a gradual (generally a psalm), and alleluia between these readings. Confession of the creed, a hymn of the day, and the sermon follow—sometimes with the creed following the sermon. We'll look a bit closer at these elements of the service over the next few months.

Our lectionary readings continue all this month in Luke, following the journeys of the disciples who watch, listen to, learn from, and eat, with Jesus. We also will read of the journeys of the people of Israel as they follow Moses through the wilderness in Exodus, Leviticus and Numbers, hearing him speak God's word to them and teaching how to live in community.

This month I will again hold Saturday morning Bible studies for women on the second (5/13) and fourth (5/27) Saturdays of this month. We meet at 8:30 or so in a downstairs classroom and finish in the vicinity of 10am. I'm still conferring with some folks about a date for a one-day women's retreat hopefully sometime in the next couple of months. Stay tuned.
