Pastor's Letter May, 2019

Celebrating Easter with the Psalms

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The Psalms are a rich deposit of God's grace for the believer to draw from for every time and situation in this life of faith. Here are some thoughts on three psalms that have been traditionally used by the New Testament church during the season of Easter. I encourage you to make them your own during this Easter season.

Psalm 33

The psalmist is very excited about something. He not only wants to 'shout for joy' and 'give thanks to the Lord,' but he wants you to join him. The cause for his joy and celebration is that he has a 'new song to sing.' How long has he been singing the same old song of dying and death, evil and darkness, disappointment and more disappointment? But now there's a 'new song' hitting the air-waves and he can't stop singing it. It's the 'new song' of the Lord's victory over dying and death, evil and darkness, disappointment and more disappointment. This is the 'new song' that the saints in Christ are given to sing, "And they sang a new song, saying, 'Worthy are you to take the scroll and open its seals, for you were slain and by your blood you ransomed people for God..." (Rev.5:9-10). Who are these singers who sing this new song? The psalmist identifies them as "the nation whose God is the Lord, the people whom he has chosen as his heritage!" (vs.12) That's not a geographical 'nation' but the 'nation' made up of those from 'all nations' who have heard the word and been baptized into Christ and live by faith. In other words – it's you! So, "sing to him a new song!"

Psalm 66:1-8

Psalm 66 begins with shouting and singing. This is not a psalm to be prayed quietly in your closet. As we make this psalm our prayer, we join with 'all the earth.' The invitation to 'come and see what God has done' is extended to you even as you extend it to others. Our attention is directed to that amazing rescue called "the Exodus." But as we know, 'the Exodus' was only a prelude to the major work of God – the deliverance of His people from slavery to sin and death by His cross and resurrection from the dead. How much more fitting is it for us than them to "shout for joy to God"? "Bless our God, O peoples; let the sound of his praise be heard."

Psalm 147:1-11

Psalm 147 is one of the five "Praise the Lord" Psalms that bring the Psalmody to its conclusion. "It is good to sing praises to our God." What follows is a summary of reasons for why praise for the Lord is good. First our attention is directed to the way the Lord responds to the least and the lowest in this world - "the outcasts" and the "brokenhearted." That these outcasts and brokenhearted are the only ones who are mentioned makes it is safe to assume that this Psalm is the personal prayer of those who can say, 'that's me!' In a world that shows special favor for the successful, the beautiful, the powerful, etc., this is a prayer for those who are none of the above before God. The outcast and the brokenhearted have a particular reason to "praise the Lord." He Himself became an outcast and suffered a broken heart in His Son, Jesus Christ for you who were 'outcast' from the Kingdom of Heaven because of your sin and are brokenhearted over your guilt. He has brought you near to Him and mended your heart. It is indeed good to praise the Lord.

Notes from your Deaconess

May, 2019

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Whenever you hear breaking news of terrorist attacks, fatal accidents, flooding, fires, or tornadoes causing deaths and loss of homes, whether of a family's dwelling in central Maine or of a world-famous beautiful cathedral, what is your first reaction? I hope that one of your initial responses is to call on our heavenly Father for his mercy and help for those facing all difficulties—as Luther includes in his explanation of the second commandment. He reminds us that we should call on God's name in every trouble, pray, praise, and give thanks. Our briefest prayer may often be "Lord have mercy!" which we use every week in our Divine Service. The Lord's Prayer also always has relevance in our prayers for ourselves and others.

The next three sections which we come to in this slow tour I've been taking with you of the Lutheran Service Book (pages 282 to 289), consist of sets of prayers organized for our use. Sometimes we want a few more things to say, but aren't sure how to address our Father. We find two liturgies for *Responsive Prayer* which could simply be read by an individual, but have been designed for a leader and another one or more to respond. These would work well for a family worship time. These two consist of a large number of verses from scripture, and both also include the Lord's Prayer and the Apostles' Creed. The third liturgy, *The Litany*, also has a form which alternates between petitions covering a wide array of situations, and responses such as "have mercy," and "help us, good Lord." We have occasionally used *The Litany* during the prayers portion of our Sunday worship services.

The lectionary readings for May this year continue in Exodus journeying with Moses. We'll begin Leviticus near the end of the second week of the month, the part of the Torah particularly focusing on the Law, the laws given to Israel for right living, and also read a bit of Numbers near the end of the month. In the New Testament readings, we'll be reading from Luke's gospel, following the journeys of the disciples who watch, listen to, learn from, and eat, with Jesus.

I plan to hold Saturday morning Bible studies for women on May 11 and 25. We have been considering the Beatitudes which Jesus spoke in his Sermon on the Mount in Matthew 5.

Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything by prayer and supplication with thanksgiving let your requests be made know to God. Philippians 4:6

MOVIE REVIEW: "UNPLANNED" Excerpted from https://blogs.lcms.org/2019/movie-review-unplanned/ By Holly Scheer

"Unplanned" tells the story of Abby Johnson (Ashley Bratcher), a former Planned Parenthood director who becomes pro-life after witnessing an ultrasound-guided abortion firsthand.

As depicted in the film, Johnson is first drawn to Planned Parenthood by a desire to help women after having had two abortions of her own, one of which was completed at home, leaving her upset that she was not informed by the clinic staff of what would happen.

Johnson's view on abortion abruptly changes when she witnesses the ultrasound-guided abortion of a 13-week old baby. Unable to morally reconcile the reality of what she has witnessed with the 22,000 abortions she has overseen at the clinic, she approaches Coalition for Life members Shawn Carney (Jared Lotz) and his future wife, Marilisa (Emma Elle Roberts), whom she previously met on the sidewalk while walking women into the clinic. She asks for their help leaving Planned Parenthood and goes on to face her family, her former employer in court, and her own conscience as she struggles to cope with her years of employment with America's biggest abortion provider.

There has been much discussion about the film's R rating, with some suggesting it is politically motivated, but the rating should be taken seriously. The movie contains material that is difficult to watch because abortion is the loss of human life, and the movie does not shy away from showing the horror of that loss.

Johnson's time inside Planned Parenthood makes her a powerful pro-life voice. Her story is one that people need to see and learn from. This isn't a movie only for those who already consider themselves strongly pro-life. It is a movie that looks honestly and deeply at the issue of abortion and has the potential to change minds and hearts. The more people who see it, the better — but you should see it knowing that it imparts difficult, painful truth.
