Pastor's Letter November, 2016 **"The National Day of Thanksgiving**"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

The national day of Thanksgiving was officially established by president Abraham Lincoln in 1863 to be a day of "thanksgiving and praise to our beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens." But long before Lincoln made it 'official,' people had set aside a particular day to give thanks to God for the 'daily bread.' As soon as the pilgrims were settled, they invited their neighbors to join them in a day of thanksgiving to God for His care in supplying abundant food for them to eat and survive. George Washington is said to have declared a national day for thanksgiving before it became a national holiday.

It's important as we celebrate the day of Thanksgiving this year, that we also give thanks to our 'beneficent Father who dwelleth in the heavens" for our daily bread. One of the distinctions between believers and unbelievers is in how each sees the 'hand' behind the food that fills the table and plate and stomach.

Unbelievers see only the 'hand of man' behind the abundant production of food. Man has put his brain to work and learned how to get the most out of seed and dirt and water. We have learned that there are certain 'laws of nature' that are at work, and if thanksgiving is due, it goes to 'mother earth' without any connection the Creator of the earth, Who endowed the earth with all ability to produce food.

Believers ought to see all of this much differently. We see the 'hand of God' in the growth and production of the food that we eat, as well as the distribution system that brings it to us, the wealth that allows us to purchase it, the homes in which we eat it, all from God. Believers see the 'hand of God' in the abundance of food that we have as the gracious answer of the 'beneficent Father in the heavens' who has heard our prayer, 'give us this day our daily bread,' and answered us from His abundant love and care.

It may have been easy for the Israelites of old to see the 'hand of God' behind the manna and the quail that they ate for 40 years in the desert. But it should be just as easy for the 'new Israel' to see the same 'and of God' in our Lord, Jesus Christ, who took pity on the hungry crowds and multiplied the bread and fish in His divine hands and supplied them with more than they could eat.

Notice how clearly the Psalmist sees the 'hand of God' behind the bountiful harvest of food: "You visit the earth and water it; you greatly enrich it; the river of God is full of water; you provide their grain, for so you have prepared it. You water its furrows abundantly, settling its ridges, softening it with showers, and blessing its growth. You crown the year with your bounty; your wagon tracks overflow with abundance. The pastures of the wilderness overflow, the hills gird themselves with joy, The meadows clothe themselves with flocks, the valleys deck themselves with grain, they shout and sing together with joy." (Psalm 65:9-13)

As we celebrate Thanksgiving this year, let's be sure to do so as believers who recognize the 'hand' behind it all. Remember to give thanks to God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

This month we'll begin looking at specific parts of our Divine Service. The service itself starts after the bells, prelude, announcements, and our greeting of each other. In all five settings of the Divine Service which we follow, a section entitled *Confession and Absolution* prepares us for the *Service of the Word* and *Sacrament*. Usually we start with a hymn, but this is optional for the service. (The italicized instructions in red ("rubrics") for the service in the hymnal offer recommendations which may or may not be used.)

We officially begin with the **Invocation**. To invoke means "to call upon." The pastor speaks for all of us, calling upon God, "In the name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit." We affirm, or agree with this prayer by responding "Amen", a word meaning, "truth".

Before we enter our time of confession we call on our triune God with this prayer to be present with us while at the same time we turn ourselves towards Him. We remember our baptism, as well as Jesus Christ's baptism by John. At Jesus' baptism the Holy Spirit descended in the form of a dove, and the Father spoke his words of affirmation "You are my beloved Son, with you I am well pleased" (Luke 3:22). We see the clear triune presence of God at that time and in that place. Jesus began his first recorded sermon in the gospel of Luke by reading Isaiah's words "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me" (Luke 4:18, from Isaiah 61:1). Jesus also promised, "For where two or three are gathered in my name, there I am among them" (Matthew 18:20).

Things we do with our body also affect our focus. We stand for the invocation (and the hymn before it), and in some churches a cross is carried into the church during the hymn and parishioners commonly bow slightly as it passes their row. These postures indicate our attention, respect and honor. Our pastor makes the sign of the cross, a motion of tracing the cross upon himself, as he speaks the words of invocation. We may join in making this motion. In so doing, we recall that through baptism we participated in Christ's death on the cross, and that our life in him bears that cross as well. Jesus proclaimed "Whoever does not bear his own cross and come after me, cannot be my disciple" (Luke 14:27). In our baptism we received the Holy Spirit, and thus began our new lives as children of God. We also remember that the Holy Spirit placed an invisible mark or seal upon us, and we think of that mark as cross-shaped, and so trace that shape upon ourselves.

And so, we begin our weekly times together by recalling for ourselves and before God his promises given to us through his word and our baptisms, of his presence with us as well as our unity before him as his children in Christ.

BOARD FOR MISSIONS - MEETING MINUTES, 10/5/16

Present: Amanda Goldsmith, Avis Grant; Dan Callahan, Deb Nielsen, Brian Watson, Andrea Watson, Pastor Nielsen.

After a review of the minutes from the September meeting, the follow topics were discussed:

- First Choice Pregnancy Center Waterville sent a flyer for an upcoming fundraising banquet.
- Lutherans For Life A regional representative contacted pastor Nielsen appealing for congregational support of the organization that works nationally to promote awareness of life issues. The Board voted to recommend that \$250 be sent to LfL in October and that a "Life Sunday" be held in January during which the Board will use Mission funds to match a 'door offering' after worship.
- Seminary Student Adoptions Assignments were made by Concordia Theological Seminary. 2nd year student Michael McGinnley whom we had adopted last year, and 1st year student, Grant Sorenson. Pastor Nielsen will contact both students to request that they keep in touch with the congregation and work with Michael McGinnley to arrange a visit to the congregation.
- Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter Brian reported on the beginning of construction of the 2nd floor which he is managing. Opportunity for future support will be needed to furnish apartments and office space. He reported that the Shelter received a \$75,000 award from Maine State Housing in recognition that 96% of those who left the shelter remain in stable housing a year later.
- The Board discussed whether it should work to develop on-going support to selected organizations and projects or seek to support a broader range of organizations and projects for a brief period of time. It was decided that we should seek to provide on-going support to selected organizations in order to develop deeper connections, but that we may also respond

to on-time opportunities as needed. It would also like to invite new projects/organizations from time to time as well.

The following were tagged for on-going support: Seminary student adoptions; Hope Lutheran Church- Bangor; Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter; Greater Waterville Area Food Bank; Children's Home For Little Wanderers; Lutheran Heritage Foundation; Garuna Foundation; Lutherans For Life.

The Board voted to recommend the following for approval by the Church Council at its October 17th meeting:

- Garuna Foundation adoption of three students: \$1,080
- Lutheran For Life: \$250

- November 2, 2016 6:30pm. Meeting to be held at the Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter
- December 7, 2017 6:00pm. Meeting to be held at Dan Callahan's home.

The Board encourages members of the congregation who would like to participate on the board to speak to any of the members or pastor.
