Pastor's Letter October, 2016 "You Know What They Say About Opinions"

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

A forest ranger in one of the National Parks of this country was leading a hike of 15 people through a remote area of the park. The squawk of his two-way radio was a nuisance to him so he turned it off. As the group returned to the trailhead they found many other rangers and rescue personnel who were worried and anxious over them. As it turned out, a grizzly bear had been spotted by another ranger and the bear was following the group of 15. The headquarters had been trying frantically to warn the ranger of the danger without success.

Needless to say, there are many people who are making their way through life who have turned off the voice of the One who is the Way and the Truth and the Life. And that is a very dangerous thing to do.

God speaks to us through His Word – the Bible. He does not speak to us through dreams or intuitions or lines in our palms or the alignment of the stars. God gets right down to our level when He speaks by putting it down in writing. The Bible is the voice of God who speaks to us with words - words of warning and direction and encouragement to bring us safely to our heavenly home.

In His Word, God tells us who He is and He tells us who we are. He tells us the way that He has created us and how we are to live. He tells us our destination and all that He has done through His Son to see that we arrive there safely. He tells us that He will always be with us and protect us in every situation and stage of life.

If it were not for His Word, how would we ever know if God were for us or against us? We would be left to our own intuition. Some days our intuition assures us that God is for us. But on other days we would think that He must be against us. Only by listening to Him speak to us can we be assured on good days and bad days that God is for us.

If it were not for His Word, how would we ever know how God is for us? We would be left to our own instincts. Our natural instincts tell us that God is for us when we are good and do good things and when we obey the rules. Only by listening to Him speak to us can we be know that God is for us even while we were still sinners. He is for us through His Son, crucified, died, buried and raised from the dead on our behalf.

If the church is to take its mission to "make disciples" seriously, it must take Bible Study seriously. The words of John Bright, in His book, "The Kingdom of God," are painfully accurate. "It is unnecessary to furnish proof that there exists even among Christians a widespread Biblical illiteracy, and it is rather gracious to deplore the fact as disastrous. The church will not forever survive if steps are not taken to remedy it… Uprooted from the Bible we have no proper place to stand… It is therefore no light thing that the bible should have become so strange a book to the average churchgoer."

When the church turns off the Word of God, its members not only become lost, the church is also unable to carry out its mission to make disciples. It seems only too obvious that this is the reason why we see those churches that no longer consider the Bible to be the Word of God, "tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and the cunning craftiness of men in their deceitful scheming." (Eph.4:14).

How vitally important it is, both for ourselves and for effective evangelism and witnessing, to be "built up until we all reach unity in the faith and in the knowledge of God..." (Eph. 4:13). Otherwise we "go" with nothing to say except our own opinions. And you know what they say about opinions. Yours in Christ.

Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

In this article we'll take a look at the overall shape of our liturgy. Our Divine Service derives its shape of word and sacramental meal first from Old Testament Jewish rituals. The Passover Seder (seder=order of service) for the Hebrew people parallels our liturgy as families celebrated this meal together which began with prayers and teaching. In their case the teaching concerned the exodus of God's people from Egypt. The special meal of lamb followed the teaching and retold, in a physical manner the events and means by which God had provided that the angel of death would bypass their blood-marked homes, and had nourished the Jewish people for their departure. They celebrate this meal once a year, while we celebrate our meal weekly. Services of prayer having extensive use of the Psalms as both prayers and songs, and also of teaching in synagogues, developed through those centuries as well.

Jesus' ministry itself included both teaching/word and miracles/sacrament. Recall that in our Lutheran understanding, we define *sacrament* as God's word combined with a physical, tangible object which delivers the promise of God, truly a miraculous thing when received through faith. The clearest gospel precedent for our order of word and sacrament occurred after Jesus' resurrection. That first day of the week when Jesus met the two disciples walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus, he taught them many things about himself from the scriptures. Upon reaching the town of Emmaus and agreeing to stay as guest to the two disciples who had still not recognized him, he acted as host of the meal. He took the bread, gave thanks and broke it and gave it to them. At that moment the disciples recognized him as Jesus, risen from the dead, and at that same moment the person of Jesus disappeared from their sight.

We follow this order with our worship except when the sacrament of baptism occurs. Baptism, the act of God's word combined with water, killing the sinful person and bringing him or her to new life, provides the entrance into the body of the church, the family of God. It fittingly belongs at the beginning of a service. Most of the particular pieces of our service have had their location in this service for centuries, and we'll work our way through them in the coming months. Some of those sections remain essentially the same week to week and season to season. These we designate as "ordinaries". Other sections change weekly, with church seasons, or for certain feast or festival days. These we identify as "propers", since they have a proper place at certain times.

Speaking of "times", we have two ideas about time in church life. The usual way of considering time has to do with a Greek word *chronos*, which you may recognize as a root of words like chronological and chronic. This kind of time we measure with clocks, days, movement of the earth and the sun with respect to each other. We move through our days, meet on Sundays or go to work or bed with respect to this type of time. The Greek word *kairos* has a different kind of sense about time. It relates to some distinct quality of a human experience or event embedded in that *chronos* time. This might refer to particular encounters, opportunities, or seasons of our lives like going through a certain illness or surgery, or becoming a parent. Other events may have stood out or been imbedded in our memories due to joy, fear, horror, surprise, sorrow, or the deep significance of what the experience did to us, perhaps changing our perception of the world. Each year and each week in our Divine Service at church we revisit, recall and reconnect with the events of our Lord's work for us past and present along with our church family and with all the church past, present and yet to come.

BOARD FOR MISSIONS MEETING MINUTES – SEPTEMBER 6, 2016

Current Projects:

Mid-Maine Homeless Shelter: Men's clothing drive for this year may need to be put on hold during their renovation work on 2nd floor. Board to consider other projects.

Seminary Students: Board will recommend adoption of two students for 2016/17 academic year. 2nd year student Michael McGinnley and a 1st year student. Pastor will file the applications with the seminary.

Hope Lutheran Church: Board will recommend increasing the monthly support to Hope Lutheran Church – Bangor from \$200 to \$400. To be reviewed after a year. Pastor will send a letter along with the first check for \$400 with explanation for the increase.

Other Business: Amanda will distribute a spreadsheet of previous missions giving over the past several years. The Board would like to see how it might direct future funding. We have funded several projects repeatedly and some only occasionally. Should the Board try to focus on particular projects to develop a closer identity with? Or should the Board focus on introducing the congregation to the board array of mission work that is taking place throughout the church at large and locally? It was suggested that the Board consider dividing the mission funds 50/50 between 'ongoing' projects and 'new' projects. It was suggested that the application for new projects be redistributed to the congregation.

Dan reported on his follow-up work to the "The Wittenberg Project." He presented the book, "The Wittenberg Project" to the church library. He sent the book to the project director and president of the Synod, each of whom signed the book with a personal note of thanks to the congregation for their gift of support.

Dan also reported on his follow-up work for the "Lutherans For Life" project. He turned over a box of promotional items to be shared with the congregation at the next "Life Sunday."

Dan will contact Rev. Jeff Ehlers from Gaurna Foundation for status of his involvement overseas.

The Board voted to recommend the following for approval by the Church Council at its September 12th meeting:

- Adoption of two seminary students @ \$250 / month.
- Adoption of support for Hope Lutheran Church @ \$400 / month.
- LCMS Disaster Relief undesignated gift \$1,500.
- Central Maine Food Bank \$500.
