#### The Ascension of Our Lord"

Lift up your heads, O you gates; be lifted up, you ancient doors, that the King of glory may come in. Who is this King of glory? The LORD strong and mighty, the LORD mighty in battle. Lift up your heads, O you gates; lift them up, you ancient doors, that the King of glory may come in. Who is he, this King of glory? The LORD Almighty — he is the King of glory. Psalm 24:7-10

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

In ancient times the way in which people protected themselves from unwanted intruders was to build a wall around their castles, cities and even entire countries. The wall that was built around Jerusalem still stands. There is still a wall around an entire country – the wall of China. Until fairly recently, the Berlin Wall stood – which actually became a wall to keep people in rather than out.

In order to get into a castle or city, one had to enter through a heavily guarded entrance which was sealed by a gate. The gate was opened to let armies out or back in again from battle. Since the gate was a huge and heavy covering that took a lot of work to open, there would be a door cut into the gate to let individuals who wanted to come in or go out pass through.

Psalm 24 describes an entourage approaching a walled city and the command is given to open the gate, lift up the door so that they may enter.

Throughout the Gospels, we come into contact with angels who accompanied Jesus during His earthly ministry. An angel appeared to Zechariah, to Mary, and Joseph before Jesus was born to be sure that He got the right name and that Mary wasn't "put away". At his birth a company of angels appeared to the shepherds in the fields announcing the good news to them.

As Jesus' ministry begins, He is led into the desert to be tempted by the devil, and at the end of the 40 days, the angels attend to Him. Later, as Jesus stands before Pontius Pilate he says that if He wanted to He could summon legions of angels that would come and rescue Him.

As the women arrive at the tomb of Jesus on the first Easter morning they find it guarded by angels who announce the good news that He is risen! And after 40 days from His resurrection from the dead, Jesus ascends, and the angels are there to explain it all to the disciples who are looking into the air.

I think that it is perfectly safe to assume that the entourage that announces the arrival of the "King, the Lord of glory," is the legion of angels who are escorting Jesus to His heavenly throne. And as they approach the city, they call to the heavenly angels in charge of the gate of the heavenly city, "Lift up your heads, O you gates; be lifted up, you ancient doors."

And an amazing thing happens. A discussion that takes place. The gatekeepers don't recognize Jesus. And they ask, twice, "Who is this King of glory." "Who is he, this king of glory." They look out among the advancing entourage and they don't see anyone fitting the description of a king of glory. And both times, the angels with Jesus reply, "The Lord strong and mighty, the Lord mighty in battle. The Lord Almighty – He is the king of glory." But now the question is, "Why didn't the heavenly gate keepers recognize Jesus? Why did they have to ask for the King of glory to be identified?"

It was because Jesus ascended into heaven as the Word made Flesh. And not only that, His flesh was bruised, battered and sacred. He still bears the nail holes in his feet and hands. As one ancient theologian puts it, "They didn't recognize him because he was clothed in the poor tunic of our nature. His garments were red from the winepress of human evils."

This confusion of the gatekeepers over the identity of the King of glory is repeated much later by St. John who, in his revelation, is given a glimpse into heaven where the ascended king rules from the throne. There is a question in heaven over who has the authority to open the scroll that contains the record of those who are saved. The angels ask, "who is worthy to break the seals and open the scroll?" And then everyone sees that all along, right in the center of the throne, was a Lamb, "looking like it had been slain," and He is worthy to open the scroll. (Rev. 5:1-6).

One of the several reasons that we celebrate the Ascension of our Lord is because He bears an eternal witness of His death for the atonement of our sins to the Father, and for His sake, the Father has mercy on us poor sinners. Ascension Day is 50 days from Easter - May 9th. We will mark the Ascension of Our Lord on Sunday, May 10th in our worship service.

Notes from your Deaconess May 2020

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Some of these spring days the sun shines brightly, while on others we only have clouds, wind, and rain. We wonder when our lives will shift to patterns of moving more often and farther from home without restrictions and the serious caution we've needed to maintain these past weeks. Yet the trees have begun budding, spring bulbs bloom, perennials are emerging in gardens, the birds have begun their annual northern migration (hummingbirds arrived in Maine mid-April), and our Lord's in control—he is risen, ascended to the Father and keeps our lives in his care.

The entire month of May — until the very last day when we celebrate Pentecost — we observe the season of Easter! We have wonderful hymns for this season in our service book, thirty-three in fact. The origins of some of their *texts* date as far back as the sixth and eighth centuries (see #478, #487, and #489), and one comes from as recently as 2000 (#476). The *tunes* for #459 and #460 possibly have been around since the eleventh century, and a couple were written in this century (#472 and #486). Most of these Easter hymns come from European and American traditions, but we do have one Tanzanian Easter hymn included (#466).

I just began looking closely at #479, "Christ is Risen, Christ is Living," which I do not believe we have ever sung together at church in the past. From the mid-twentieth century and of Spanish origins, with its tune in a minor key, it still exudes a joyful sound and text. Snippets of scripture from Luke 24, John 14, 1 Corinthians 15, and Romans 6 weave through its lines...

Christ is risen, Christ is Living, Dry your tears, be unafraid!... Death has lost its sting and terror, Christ the Lord has come to reign... Let us thank our God, who causes Hope to spring up from the ground; Christ is risen, Christ is giving Life eternal, life profound. How about challenging yourself to read one of these hymns every day of May—even if you don't know or can't figure out their tunes? On May 21, we will celebrate Ascension Day, remembering that Jesus ascended to the Father forty days after the resurrection. You could look through the Ascension Day hymns (#491 to #495) on that date.

Our daily lectionary readings continue this month in Luke, following the journeys of the disciples who watch, listen to, learn from, and eat, with Jesus. We'll read many of the most well-known parables during these weeks, and right into the accounts of Holy Week before June. The Old Testament readings from Leviticus and Numbers continue the accounts of the people of Israel moving with Moses through the wilderness, hearing him speak God's word to them, teaching how to worship, and how to live in community set apart from the nations around.



- If you're using another reading schedule or guide, stick with it. The important thing is to be in the Word daily.
